#### LOCAL OPTION.

One of the surprises of the late election is the enactment by a majority of about 3,000 of the local option law. On account of the great majority against state prohibition a few years ago, there was general doubt as to whether its friends could muster sufficient votes to pass the present measure. This is especially true, as the provisions of the law are sweeping, going fully as far in their regulations as the most pronounced local optionist could have desired. This, the opponents of the measure urged as an argument against it, and doubtless with more or less effect.

In spite of it all, however, the law has been declared for by a majority of the people, and it is entirely probable that in many if not every county in the state the question of whether or not the liquor traffic shall be continued, will be submitted to a vote in the November election. This, is turn means that in some of them, at least, local prohibition will be adopted, and that saloons in such will have to go out of business. In how many of the counties this result will happen, remains to be seen. This issue will cut a large figure in the November election, and it is probable, will almost overshadow the issues in the presiden. tial campaign.

In Benton, the majority for the adoption of the local option law is 380. The figures are probably double that by which the most ardent local optionist hoped to carry the county. They show a wide change in public sentiment from the conditions that prevailed in Benton county a few years ago, and possibly indicate that the new sentiment will directly find itself entrenched in law and in fact. In any event, there will be another battle of ballots, and perhaps a battle in the courts, and in both there will be fighting all long the line.

The adoption of the law in the state is the most startling political event in many years.

#### IS IN QUARANTINE.

With Smallpox-The Case is Very Mild-Patient is an Easterner.

Corvallis has a case of smallpox.

The patient is Arthur Kroening, Butter 171 to 20 c per lb. who arrived in Oregon from Wisconsin, six weeks ago. He has been in Corvallis a couple of weeks and has been employed both at Wheat 75 per bushel. Strong's sawmill and with the construction gang of the Independent Flour 1.05 to 1.30per sack Telephone Company. The case Butter 12½ to 15 per lb was first noticed Thursday morning, Creamery 50 per roll and the attention of the authorities was at once called to the matter. Chickens Kroening denied that he had the disease, claiming that it was eczema, skin ailment to which he says he is subject. Dr. Farra was called, and in the first diagnosis, which occured in the morning, the disease was not sufficiently developed to make certain that it was smallpox. Later in the day, after a second examination, the case was pronounced a very light form of smallpox.

A feature of the disease is that Kroening does not complain of illness, he has a good appetite, and would be able to work, if permitted o be at large.

The case is thoroughly quaran-at the big of course. house on the river bank north of the sawmill, and just across the road from the slaughter house. A yellow flag at the spot gives warning to passers-by of what is inside.
