—Invoicing the stock in the J. D. Mann furniture store has been in progress for the past four days, and will be completed by this morning.

—A special meeting of the Coffee Club is called for tomorrow, Thursday, at four o'clock, to consider matters relating to the celebration. The business is important and a full attendance is desired.

—The steam laundry is now in complete running order again, and began operations yesterday morning. An incident of the removal is the addition of new appliances and machinery and an increase of capacity with assurance that better work than ever will be done hereafter.

—The eight-months-old infant of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Newton died in Portland Monday, and the interment took place in Locke cemetery yesterday afternoon. The funeral party arrived with the remains by the West-side train. Rev. Mark Noble conducted the funeral service.

—The marriage of Miss Emma Martin and Ralph Merchant occurred in Portland the 15th. The bride is second daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Martin, who resided for many years in this city. Mr. Merchant is employed at the store of Olds, Wortman & King's.

—Saturday night an Albany confetti seller on the outskirts of the carnival grounds threw some confetti in the face of an Albany woman accompanied by her husband, when the latter requested him to stop. He deliberately did it again, and then something happened. The smart Aleck young man was given a thorough whipping, and the husband was universally endorsed for a good job.

—The tie vote for constable in Alsea precinct remains unsettled. The candidates were Lou Rycraft and Thomas Bradley, and both were cited to appear last Saturday at the clerk's office for settlement by lot of which should have the office. Neither candidate, however, appeared at the hour named, and the default makes it necessary for the county court to appoint a man to fill the vacancy.

—The Independent Telephone Co. has an office now, and there is regular communication with Philomath and of the farmers' line north of town. The office is on the second floor of the Zierolf brick, and Miss Adams is in charge. The Philomath line has several subscribers in Philomath and along the way between the two towns, and new phones are being put in every day. The progress of construction on the local system is more or less retarded by delays in the delivery of poles.

—There is guessing locally over the question of how big the crowd will be at the coming celebration. One man in position to know figures out that more people will be in Corvallis at that time than have been in attendance at any local celebration since the 4th when they had the sham battle. (The latter instance was about a dozen years ago. The fact that Dallas and Lebanon are the nearest towns that are celebrating makes it likely that Corvallis will have a very large crowd.)

—An innovation on the usual custom has been planned by the general committee for public convenience at the celebration. Many will approve, but others, of course, will kick. There are always those who kick. A man who fell heir to a fortune of \$100,000 kicked because the inheritance wasn't all money instead of part real estate. The proposed innovation is temporary seats to be placed at the outer edge of the pavement along the principal blocks on Main street. It will be a resting place for the aged, infirm and weary. It will be a place for mothers with babies in their arms to rest for a moment. They won't be able to see much, but they will get that precious few minutes of rest for which people in crowds so many times long in the hot mid-afternoon of a 4th of July. The seats are to be placed in position Saturday afternoon, and will be available for the sacred concert Sunday evening.

All persons using water for flowers, lawns or garden will oblige the Company by turning off the water promptly at nine o'clock.
