The section of the law over is as follows: "The board of directapportionment to such child, when able to get a receipt. ever the parents shall present a written request, accompanied by a written permit from the board of the adjoining district". In this de cision, Judge Hamilton says, "The word "may" as used, would give the directors power to make the transfer, but it would not necessarily follow that the transfer is to be made in every case in which application therefor is made'

The question of whether or not the word "may" is mandatory, leaving no discretion with the directors, has been one of extreme interest throughout Benton county. for a petticoat material-all In several districts there were cases like that in the Newton neighborhood, and in all, the question of what the law meant was widely for so wearful a silk. and vehemently discussed. After the decision of Attorney General Crawford, which was published in full in the Times, it was generally accepted as law that if the parents of the child requested it, the transfer of school money had to be made, but the decision just rendered upsets that theory. Whether or not the case will be carried to the supreme court, is not known.
