We have no such precint in the city of Corvallis all of which extend outside the city limits. These precincts cannot be changed under our laws before November o6, and not then unless the county court shall deem it advisable. think it will be plainly seen, that if the Jayne bill had become a law, it would not have been possible for the saloon interests in Corvallis to have even demanded a vote on this question June 1, 'o8. As nearly all the towns in the state went wet

at the last election, the Jayne bill not only requests from the temperance people, but a few very urgent lett rs from the saloon men in Corthe Jayne bill.

The amendments to the Jayne bill, known as the Coe amendments, were incorporated in the report of the senate judiciary committee, which provided that on a petition of not less than 25 per cent of the legal voters of a town like Corvallis could vote only as a whole, not by wards or precinets; and further provided that the election should not be held before the first Monday in June 1906, and only biennially thereafter. I favored and voted for these amendments which would have passed the Senate had they come in a little earlier so the Senators could have had more time to examine them. The majority of the senators including myself, were in favor of passing some measure that could not be justly charged with unfairness by either sidethat after being submitted to the people and a vote taken, would settle the question for a few years at least. We Loped to eliminate what we consider the most objectionable and dangerous feature of the present law, allowing only ten per cent of the voters on either side to force an election upon the people every year on this question.
