Tokio, May 28.—News has been received here that Admiral Rojestvensky's fleet sunk an American steamer off Formosa about May 21. The name of the steamer is unknown. Her crew was saved.

Washington, May 27.—If an American vessel has been sunk by Rojestvensky, as reported from Tokio, an immediate demand for reparation will be made by the government. The Vladivostok cruisers sunk the British steamer Knight Commander, and Russia was compelled to make an apology and pay an indemnity to Great Britain.
