—Mrs. L. L. Porter of Oregon City is the guest of her parents in this city.

—Charles McKnight of Marshfield is expected to arrive today for a Commencement visit with college friends.

—After a three month's visit with Santa Barbara relatives. Mrs. E. F. Pernet and children are expected to reach home next Thursday.

—Miss Annie Ewing, a former popular O. A. C. student, is making a Commencement visit with Corvallis friends.

—Final examinations for the college year began at O. A. C. yesterday. They will be laid aside tomorrow for the State Track meet, but will be renewed Monday, on which date they will all be finished.

—A special meeting of the Coffee club is called by Mrs. Moore, the president, for Monday evening at four o'clock. Business of importance is to be considered, and all members are urged to be present.

—F. B. Linfield, director of the Montana experiment station, was the guest last Saturday and Sunday of W. T. Shaw. Mr. Linfield was much impressed with the beauty of O. A. C. campus.

—Mrs. Jones, nee Erma Lawrence, of Oregon City and Miss Anna Samuels of Portland, both members of O. A. C.'s alumni are guests at the Spangler home.

—Milton P. Morgan is a Portland visitor this week. He is there to meet his brother, a marine on the cruiser "Philadelphia" now stationed at Portland. Mr. Morgan will visit the Fair before his return.

—It is claimed that the half mile race at the State meet tomorrow will be worth all it costs to go Salem and return. There are those who believe that the distance will be run faster than it ever has been on the Coast. They figure that Greenhaw will be the man to do it, and that he will win the event.

—Robert Coshaw, of Salem, for several years past connected with the woolen mills, was in town Wednesday, looking for a business location. He traveled the town over but was unable to find a suitable dwelling. He looked at business rooms available, present and prospective. He is in the clothing line. He made no engagements, but expects to make the town another visit.

—Eugene is sending a big delegation of student backers and others to Salem to the track meet, hoping the side liners may assist their track men to win. O. A. C. lads, in poker parlance, are trying to "see their crowd and go it some better." With the unusually low fare, it looks now as if the O. A. C. delegation would be a very large and certainly a very enthusiastic one.

—The O. A. C. athletic union elected officers Thursday, naming Glen Goodman for president, Miss Bonney, secretary, and Miles Belden treasurer. An important move made by the union was the determination to place the management of athletics into the hands of a graduate manager. This is the plan in vogue at all big institutions. The management involves an allotment of time and trouble that no regular student is in position to accord to the work. In consequence, both the student and his class work ordinarily suffer. At the annual meeting Thursday, the union elected Fred Stimson graduate manager and adopted a resolution recommending to the faculty athletic committee that he be paid a salary for his services.

—The O. A. C. exhibit at the fair is to be found on the second floor of the Oriental building, next to the forestry building.

—Prof. W. T. Shaw leaves next Wednesday for St. Paul, Minnesota, to be in attendance at the Marriage of his sister, on the 20th inst. Prof. Shaw may remain East all summer.

—The indications now are that a crowd of possibly 200 people, if not more, will go to Salem this, Saturday morning, to attend the state track meet. A half fare rate for the round trip has been secured, making a round trip ticket cost only \$1.35, and a big lot of students and others are taking advantage of the occasion for a holiday. The cadet band makes the trip and furnishes music at the meet.

—A two story store building, 100 feet square with a theatre on the upper floor, all for Corvallis, is talked about. It is, indeed, declared to be projected. Marshall Miller is, if the enterprise goes, to be the builder. He has told friends that he has been considering such a structure for some time, and that he has at last determined to build. That is all the TIMES knows about it, and it gives the statement here for what it is worth, a diligent search yesterday having failed to find Mr. Miller in time to get a confirmation. The proposed site is in the rear of Berman's store.

—In yesterday's Oregonian, Trainer Hayward, of Eugene, claims that he will win the state track meet at Salem for the university by a score of 61 to 58 for O. A. C. A schedule of the events and the places Mr. Hayward assigns appears with the statement. He claims that his man Friessell will defeat Williams in the 100 yard dash. The claims will probably take a good many people from O. A. C. to Salem to see how the thing is all going to be done.
