\section*{NEARLY THREE TO ONE. Bond Issue for Mountain} | Water. |
| :---: | In Thursday's water bond elec-

ion, the bond issue of $\$ 75,000$.for
municipal water plant was carried municipal water plant wast carried
by a vote of nearly three to one. by a vote of nearly three to one.
The figures are, for bonds, 278 ;
 about 30 votes less than in the reg-
ular city election in June.
The majority in favor of bonds
is somewhat heavier than the
friends of mountain
heaver than the
friends of mountain water expect-
ed. though a vote of two to one was
freely predicted by them when the
polls opened. A poll of the town pade up the day before showed majority with as many doubtful as sure votes against bonds, and a
chance for many of the doubtful to be captured for mountain water.
This not only happened but great
inroads were made in the ranks of This not only happened but great
inoads were made in the ranks of
those counted on by the opposition as certain. It is said that their
pol showed 15 , votes against
mountain water. mountain water.
It is certain now that if there
ad been a week or ten more days
allowed the voters in which to beallowed the voters in which to be-
come familiar with the subject that
the opposition would have been the opposition would have been
reduced to less perhaps than 50
votes. The testimony on all sides votes. The testimony on all sides
is that the anonymous sheet issued by the opposition was an actual
detriment to the cause it professed
