—Butter fat is 22 1/2 cents at the local creamery. It is a good figure for the summer season. The price has averaged high all spring and summer. It was below 19 cents but two weeks and was then only down to 17 1/2. During the past three weeks the output of the creamery has dropped off 4,000 pounds per week. Nearly 12,000 pounds of butter was manufactured but the cream delivery has dropped off until the weekly product of butter is now down to 7,000 pounds per week.

It is reported that the Japanese have landed at several places in the Siberian Littoral between Nicholaievsk and De Kastries, and that the telegraph line to Nicholaievsk has been cut. These landings, however, are reported to be by small forces.

**Proclamation.**  
WHEREAS, The Secretary of State of the State of Oregon, has notified me in writing that pursuant to the provisions of an act entitled "An act making effective the initiative and referendum provisions of Section 1, article IV, of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, and regulating elections thereunder and providing penalties for violations of provisions of this Act," approved February 24th, 1905 there was duly filed in his office on May 24th, 1905, a referendum petition containing 6,312 signatures properly attached thereto, and certified in accordance with law ordering that House Bill Number 570, entitled an "Act to appropriate money for the payment of the expenses of the maintenance, repairs, improvements, equipment and current expenses of the Insane Asylum, Penitentiary, Reform, Deaf-mute and Blind Schools, University, Agricultural College and Normal Schools, and other current expenses of the state, and declaring an emergency," passed by the Twenty-third Legislative Assembly, shall be referred to the people of the state of Oregon for their approval or rejection at the regular general election to be held on the 4th day of June, 1906; that said 6,312 signatures to said petition are more than five per cent of the whole number of votes cast for Justice of the Supreme Court at the last regular election.

Now, therefore, I, George E. Chamberlain, governor of the State of Oregon, in obedience to the provisions of said act hereinbefore mentioned, do hereby make and issue this proclamation to the people of the state of Oregon announcing that there has been filed with the secretary of state of the state of Oregon a referendum petition with the requisite number of signatures thereto attached ordering that House Bill Number 570 entitled "An act to appropriate money for the payment of the expenses of the maintenance, repairs, improvements, equipment and current expenses of the Insane Asylum, Penitentiary, Reform, Deaf-mute and Blind Schools, University, Agricultural College and Normal Schools, and other current expenses of the state, and declaring an emergency," passed by the Twenty-third Legislative Assembly of the state of Oregon at the regular session of said Legislative Assembly, be submitted to the legal electors of the State of Oregon for their approval or rejection at the regular election to be held on the 4th day of June, 1906, the same being the first Monday in June, 1906.

Vienna, July 29.—The aged emperor of Austria evidently does not propose to be caught napping like the aged king of Sweden. There has been so much talk regarding the possible peaceable separation of Hungary, Austria playing the part of Sweden, Hungary the part of Norway, that the rulers of the dual kingdom have apparently decided to put a stop to it, and they are preparing to show the people of Hungary that any attempt at secession will be put down with the sword.

The Alledutsche Tageblatt of Vienna is authority for the statement that the military authorities of Austria are preparing for the eventuality of a campaign against Hungary, should that country continue its resistance to the emperor. The news is correct. At the command of the heir of the throne, the Archduke Francis Ferdinand, who represents the emperor in the supreme command of the army, military preparations are already being made with a view to adopting forcible methods should Hungary secede or declare her intention to do so in open parliament.

As it was feared that Hungary might take this step, the Hungarian parliament on the day of its opening was adjourned to September 15.

Portland, July 30.—Oregonian: As the result of the decision of Judge Frazer granting Trail managers permission to keep open their places of amusement on Sunday, prominent ministers at home and abroad will likely refuse to come to Portland to make addresses at the Auditorium.

Notwithstanding the attitude of churchmen, the Trail will do business on Sunday. Henry Reed said last night that the decision of the court would have to stand. "The matter has been decided," said Mr. Reed, "and there is nothing we can do. The court has ruled that the Trail can run and that is all there is to it. I do not see that we can recognize any protest on the part of the ministers."
