FOUR FIRST PRIZES

Great Showing by Miller's Fancy Poultry—Other Local Winners.

The great Lewis & Clark poultry show has passed into history, and true to her reputation Corvallis furnished her share of the winners. Dr. Lester won hen and pullet in White Wyandottes, with two entries in a very large class. J. M. Porter won second and fifth pullets Silver pencilled Wyandottes with entries against St. Louis World's Fair winners, and W. A. Bates second cockerel in Rhode Island Reds, with two entries. The pullet winning first over Mr. Porter was raised from eggs purchased of him last spring. Benton county has more fine poultry than any other county in the state, size considered. Birds were on exhibition at this show from every section of the United States, and, in the opinion of those who know, the White Wyandottes, White Plymouth Rocks and Buff Orpingtons were fit to exhibit in any poultry show in the United States.

A successful breeder of fancy poultry must also be an expert poultry judge. At this exhibition the greatest of its kind ever held on the Pacific Coast, birds entered for single prizes could not compete for pen prizes. In Buff Orpingtons F. L. Miller & Son entered but three birds for single prizes, a hen, pullet and cockerel, winning first on each of the three, while other exhibitors in the same variety entered as many as three dozen birds. These three birds of Mr. Miller's are from a special mating of his own, and were pronounced by the several judges to be the nearest true type of an Orpington, and the best even shade of rich golden buff that they had ever judged. The judges in the Buff Orpington class were Theo. Hughes of Indianapolis, males; Judge Holden of Minn., president of the American Poultry Association, females; and W. W. Browning of Ogden, Utah, pens. In Buff Leghorns Miller and son also won first and second cock birds with two entries, the birds being veterans in the show business, having a string of first prizes to their credit from San Francisco, Seattle, etc., and were formerly owned by Gene Simpson.

BOTH GUILTY.

Jury Out Only Long Enough to Take a Ballot—Kline and Hooligan.

After a three-days' trial, Mike Kline and "Truthful" Hooligan were convicted in Justice Holgate's court Wednesday of violating the local option law. The jury was out but ten minutes, and, according to the statement of one of the jurors could just as well have done the thing in a minute, except that they wanted to be decent. One of the jurors has since said that no jury of men in Benton county, if guided by reason and sincerity, could do anything else than return a verdict of guilty under the evidence and the law. The evidence of guilt he declared to be so overwhelming that there is simply no chance for any other kind of a verdict. What makes the statement of peculiar weight, is that the juror in question is not in sympathy with the local option law.

The trial came to an end when the case went to the jury at 5:30 Wednesday evening. It had been in progress since nine o'clock Monday morning. A long list of witnesses for both sides were examined. The by-laws and what purported to be minutes of the meetings at the joint were among the evidence offered for the defense. The universal opinion is that both were of far more value to the prosecution than to the defendants. For instance, one place in the so-called minutes declared that at a certain meeting the officers of the club reported that the club had been raided and that Kline and Hooligan had been fined \$300 each. Thereupon, the narration continues, the members present passed a vote of confidence in their club officers. It was also "further resolved that the pernicious activity of District Attorney Bryson and the other officers of the law is hereby condemned."

A smile of derision swept over the faces of the jurors as Deputy Attorney Bryson read from the minutes, and there is no doubt but that the record had a contrary effect to that intended by the defense.

As in the former cases, it became perfectly apparent that the place is nothing else than a saloon, conducted without license and in defiance of law, with Mike Kline as the probable owner, and with Hooligan and Milne as satellites.

Also that drinks are served in quantities to suit, and that they are paid for at saloon prices, all of which makes of the joint nothing else than a dive, occupying a place below the status of a legitimate saloon. One witness swore that on one visit he called up the crowd and that all had a drink around, for which he paid on the spot, just exactly as they do in any establishment devoted exclusively to the sale of liquor. It was also plain from the evidence that there is no club, that the so-called members do not participate in any meetings, that none of them sign a roster of membership, and that in fact the only big thing about the place is Mike, Hooligan and Milne, who run everything, and that these three are "it." It also appeared that a goodly lot of so called members have pulled out and are now testifying without reserve as to the facts that transpire at the place.

Sentence is to be passed upon Kline, the defendant, next Wednesday, when another trial begins. The general opinion is, that in view of the fact that the joint still persists in running, Judge Holgate will give the defendants the full penalty of the law, which the defendants are willfully and wantonly violating.

Sale of Water Bonds.

Sealed proposals will be received by the clerk of the Water Committee of the City of Corvallis, Benton county, Oregon, until October 20th, 1905, at six o'clock p. m. for the purchase of part or all of \$75,000 bond issue of said city, to be dated on or about January 1, 1906.

Said bonds are authorized by special legislative act of Session Laws 1905, page 1261, were sanctioned by an election held July 6, 1905, at which there were 278 votes for and 108 votes against and are to be issued to pay for the construction of a gravity water works system, bear interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, in denomination of from \$100 to \$1,000 payable semi-annually, and principle and interest are payable at Corvallis, Oregon, in U. S. gold coin 40 years after date of issue, at the rate of \$2,000 annually after 7 years, with option to pay entire issue at end of the years or any time thereafter.

The assessed valuation of the city of Corvallis, 1904, was \$384,250 of which the actual value is \$1,250,000; population within corporate limits 2400; no bonded debt, general warrant indebtedness, \$22,000 of which \$15,000 is for construction of sewer system, making a total municipal indebtedness, with said proposed issue \$77,000; no other indebtedness contemplated; entire proceeds of these bonds to be used directly for water system agricultural community.

Said Water Committee reserves the right to reject any and all bids. Each offer must be accompanied by a certified check for 2 per cent of amount of bid, to be forfeited if bid is accepted and not completed.

CAME UNCORKED.

And Booze ran out in Court Room Before Judge and Jury—Hooligan's Accident.

"Truthful" Hooligan, who "wouldn't go back on Mike; who is going to stay with Mike" had an accident while on trial in Justice Holgate's court Wednesday.
