THIRTEEN KILLED BY HOUSES FALLING OVER.

Haverstraw, N. Y., Jan. 9.—Tonight seventeen persons are missing and are believed to have gone to their death when 13 houses on Rockland street in Haverstraw tumbled over last night into a pit 60 feet deep, which had been cut by clay-diggers in connection with the brickmakers industries here. Twelve of the persons missing were occupants of the fallen houses, five were among the rescuers who went to the neighbors after the first house fell and were carried down when the twelve other houses went crashing over the precipice. The wreckage quickly caught fire, and those who were in the mass were either crushed or burned to death.

Tonight there is grave fear of another cave-in along the same street, and the occupants of seven or eight houses have moved away. Others are keeping an all night vigil, ready to alarm their neighbors in case of impending danger.

The landslide which carried away the 13 houses was caused by the fall-in of a bank under which excavators of brick manufacturers had been working for a number of years. The ground began cracking and showing signs at noon yesterday, and some of the occupants of houses along the brink took warning and left. Others believed that nothing serious would happen and remained. When the breaking occurred in the long line of land which formed the ragged edge of Rockland street the nearest house tumbled over into the pit with all who were within its walls. The occupants of the other houses prepared to leave in the face of a blinding snow storm. A number of people who lived near by rushed to their aid and were assisting them in getting out when twelve more houses went down, carrying with them not only the families which occupied them, but also several of those who had gone to their assistance. Overturned stoves set fire to the buildings. The landslide broke the water main, then cutting off the entire supply, and the fire department was helpless.

Nagasaki, Jan. 9.—News that that has failed to leak through St. Petersburg because of the cutting of communication came here today on the arrival of the transport Mongolia from Vladivostok carrying Russian refugees. The Russians told a story of horror along the R-brian Railway, as it had come to them from stories told of station blocked by mutineers, who looted and burned everything in sight.

Many of those who started for Sussia have turned back. Trains have been seized and turned on a backward course and great gaps exist in the line to the European Russian frontier. According to the refugees there has been a general uprising in Siberian Russia, which will stop operation of the railway for the winter at least, considering the difficulties maintaining the line in winter weather.

The stories of privation of horror told by the refugees confirm in the worst degree the small bits of news that have leaked out from St. Petersburg of the railway and the rebellion in the Manchurian army.

The Name Niagara.

"Everybody pronounces Niagara wrong," said a philologist. The accent of this beautiful Indian word should not be put on the syllable 'ag,' but on the syllable 'ar'—the penult—the one before the last. Niagara means 'hark to the thunder.' Its accent should fall on the penult because the Indians themselves accent it there, because in practically all our Indian names of places the penult is the accented syllable. Think of the Indian names you know. Don't you accent nearly all of them on the syllable before the last? There are, for instance, Toronto, Mississippi, Alleghany, Appalachicola, Narragansett, Tuscaloosa, Saratoga, Ticonderoga, Oswego, Conshohocken, Wissahickon and Hochelaga. In all these names the accent is on the penult. Niagara is a Huron word, and if you can find a Huron you will find that he accents it as he does Saratoga or Tuscaloosa. I don't know how we have fallen into the habit of accenting it wrong.—Chicago Chronicle.
