IF THEY MURDER

Possibly a conspiracy is hatching to murder Mountain water. Rumors that fly and the statements of a lawyer give such suggestion. Dallying with its water supply has cost Eugene \$100,000 in cash and suffering and death that money can not recompense and the plague of typhoid, though checked, is not eliminated. Constantly recurring cases of typhoid in Corvallis are a warning of how we may stand on the verge of a similar epidemic, which care alone might fend.

The people of Corvallis hear the babbling of the cool, crystal stream in the gorges of the snow peaked mountain to the west. They wait with longing for its cool, clear flow into their homes, uncontaminated and undefiled, and the banishment it will bring to the menace and dread of a fever scourge. It would seem an unseasonable time to seek now to murder, or even maim mountain water.

THE MOTHER DEAD.

And Only two Survivors Left
—The Passing of Mrs. John Day.

John Day.

Mrs. John Day died at the home of Mrs. Mattie Knight in Forest Grove at 10 o'clock Sunday night, with typhoid fever. The funeral occurred from the Christian church in Corvallis at two o'clock this afternoon, the remains having arrived from Forest Grove on the train today. The services were conducted by Rev. Handsaker, and the Order of Washington was in charge of the ceremonies. Interment was in Crystal Lake cemetery.

Mrs. Day was a native of Germany, having come to this country when a small child. She was 41 years of age on the 18th of last February.

This is the fourth death to occur in the Day family from typhoid within five weeks. Miss Eva, the eldest daughter died February 24th, another daughter, Miss Ina, Feb. 29th, and a son Joseph, March 5th. The mother, who had been ill with typhoid in this city, but who seemed about recovered, went to Forest Grove to be with her friend, Mrs. Knight for awhile, and she too, passed to the great beyond.

The only survivors are Mr. Day and one son, the latter of whom nearly died with typhoid some weeks ago in Corvallis. The case of this family is perhaps the saddest ever known in Corvallis, and the sympathy for those who are left to mourn is general and sincere.
