—The O. A. C. track team is preparing to take part in the indoor meet to be given at Columbia University on Saturday of next week.

—After a brief visit relatives left this city Mr. and Mrs. Harley Laughlin left Tuesday for some hot springs near La Grande where it is hoped that the health of Mr. Laughlin may be improved.

—One of the best things at the Opera house in a long time was the Original Dixie Jubilee singers, last night, and the house was perhaps as small in proportion as the bill was good. The basso was one of the best voices ever heard in Corvallis.

—Prof. E. F. Pernot whose terrible struggle with pneumonia is recent history, was able to be down stairs at his home for the first time today, and to communicate with a few friends by telephone, among them the Times office.

—Mrs. Humiston who recently sold her home in Corvallis arrived a day or two ago from Portland where she has been seeking a location. She will probably leave soon for the metropolis, to reside.

—Mr. Watt, who bought the home of Mrs. Belknap, which his family occupies, has purchased a half interest in a merchantile establishment at Vancouver. His partner in the business is Mr. Maryatt who was in Corvallis for a short time.

—Dr. D. Ward of Forest Grove was the guest of Father Springer Wednesday. While here he visited the college and talked to the history classes of Prof. Horner on his impressions of London gained while a medical student for two years in the British metropolis.

—Legislation is pending in the city council with reference to making the curbing on streets uniform. It is certain that within the near future curbs will be regulated by the city authorities, as is done in Eugene and all other up-to-date towns. A narrowing of that part of the street used by vehicles makes it easier to keep such streets in best condition as well as cheaper to do so. A committee of the council is now figuring on the matter with a plan not yet adopted of making the curb on 80 foot streets 16 feet and of 60 foot streets 12 feet.

In announcing the resignation of Fred C. Stimson as graduate manager of athletics the other day, the Times stated that there was "with all bills paid" a balance on hand in the athletic fund of \$490. Now comes Prof. John Fulton, secretary of the association, in a note to the Times, and says in effect that there is a balance of only a few dollars on hand and that there is \$220 in unpaid bills. Prof. Crawford, treasurer of the fund stated this morning, on inquiry, that there is a balance of student athletic tax in his hands of \$615. After paying out standing bills which Prof. Fulton says aggregate \$220, the balance should be \$395, or \$95 less than what the Times originally stated. As to the merits of the controversy, the Times knows nothing. What it does know is that if the student athletic tax is to be a bone of contention, it should be abolished. Five years ago big petitions, signed by students were presented to the board of regents, asking for the athletic tax to be authorized, but by unanimous vote the board refused to grant the request. The next year, much larger petitions, said then to have been signed by every student in college, and asking that the faculty be authorized to levy an athletic tax of one dollar per term on all students, was presented to the board by a committee of well known students. Members of the student deputation made addresses before the board, urging that athletics were not self supporting and that the tax was the only means by which deficits could be avoided. On this showing, the board adopted a resolution giving the faculty the authority to levy it, and the tax has since been in vogue. As stated, if it is to be a subject of controversy, it should be abolished. It would probably cripple athletics, but that might be a good thing. At Eugene the student athletic tax is \$5 per year.

—Instead of five, there are seven known cases of typhoid fever in Corvallis. In addition to those enumerated in Tuesday's Times, Harry Waggoner is a victim and there is another patient in the vicinity of the reading room. Never before has the disease been one-tenth so prevalent as during the past several weeks. With more than 600 students attending college the importance of using every precaution to prevent an epidemic like that at Eugene ought to be observed. In view of the situation, the city and county authorities are charged with a heavy responsibility. It is known that, in spite of the extreme precautions, new cases are appearing frequently at Eugene. Corvallis cannot afford the price that an epidemic would cost. Use only boiled water, no matter whether it comes from well or Willamette.
