STUDENT BUILDING.

At the College—More Money Needed Before Work can Begin.

The movement which began a year ago for the student building for the use of the Y. M. C. A. and other student organizations has been resumed and it is expected to build the structure this summer. The canvass for funds and work on the building were temporarily discontinued about two months ago, owing to the illness of Mr. Shepard, the secretary. The building committee, of which Prof. Lake is chairman, have taken the matter up again and have secured the co-operation of the state committee of the Y. M. C. A. in the raising of funds.

At the first meeting of the students held a little over a year ago nearly \$5,000 was pledged, the average being \$24 for each student many of whom are working their way through college. With such a spirit of heroic self sacrifice and determination as this on the part of the students, the directors of the Association have felt justified in asking the people of Corvallis and other parts of the state to aid in the erection of the building. The sum of \$4,800 has been subscribed by people outside of Corvallis, \$700 by Alumni, \$1,000 by members of the faculty, and \$1,300 by residents of Corvallis. It is necessary to raise \$2,300 more so that the building may be erected without debt.

The recent San Francisco disaster makes it difficult to secure contributions from Portland, Salem and other cities so the building committee have felt that they must look to the residents of Corvallis and Benton county for a large part of the remainder. While those who have already subscribed have been very liberal there is a large number of the committee says, who have as yet given nothing.

The project has drawn the attention of the people of the state to the college and the community, and they expect the building to be built. Those having the matter in charge are therefore bending every effort to insure its completion this summer.
