#### ANALYZING WATER.

#### -Mr. and Mrs. A. T. Grugett Many Samples Come to the College for Test-Prison Lard with Tallow Content.

Samples of water in use and for proposed use for domestic purposes have been received from cities in all parts of the state for analysis.
