## MURDER WILL OUT

OFFICERS THINK THEY CAN SOLVE THE KILLING OF SNYDER WITH KAN-SAS CITY POLICE.

Allege That They Have Surrounded George Perry, Cousin of Murdered Man, With Net of Direct and Convincing Evidence.

Portland, Oct. 9.-Portland Journal: With the aid of Kansas City officers and Mrs. Madge Snyder, widow of Carey M. Soyder, whose body was found near Hillsboro last Monday, officials of Washington county believe they are about to solve the mystery connected with the Forest Grove bank robbery and the subsequent murder of Snyder.

In ferreting out the details of the crimes they claim to have surrounded George Perry, Sayder's cousin, with a net of evidence so direct and convicting that a warrant for his arrest may be issued at any time. Perry was living at Snyder's home at the time of the bank robbery and disappearance of Snyder and shared his confidence as well as his hospi-

From Kansas City it was learned today that on his seturn there Perry had \$3,000 in cash in his possession. He also had some mineral samples which he claimed to have purchased in Colorado. The sum of \$6,000 was secured by those who looted the Forest Grove bank and detectives declare that the crime was committed by two men, who divided the booty.

It was because of his attempt to declare himself in" on the plunder hat Sayder met bie death, officers declare. They are convinced that Snyder and his wife had taken part in the original plans of the robbery and have reason to believe that Sayder was "double crossed" by the two men who successfully executed the daring plan.

Perry is well known to the police

of Kansas City. He was once arrested with Snyder on the charge of highway robbery, but was acquitted. He spent several weeks at the Snyder home during the fall of 1905 by the name of Rogers and also by the name of Brashear.

He had other names in various localities where he lived. On his return to Kaneas City Perry told a number of his friends that Leonard B Il bad visited the Snyder ranch with him. Officers are now taying to ascertain whether or not the man Rogers or Brashear may not have been Bell.

Leonard Bell has a criminal record iu Kansas City and other parts of the country that is rarely equaled in daring and success. Though he has succeeded in escaping punishment for a number of the crimes with which he has been charged, he has also been convicted. He was arrested in Clay county, Missouri, for attempting to rob a bank and as a result served seven years in the penitentiary at Jefferson City. He is said to be an expert in the use of nitroglycerin. He was formerly a cellmate with Perry and it was in a prison cell that the voman who afterward became Mrs. Suader met the man she married. In connection with Bells's record as a nitroglycerin artist officers remember that the vault of the Forest Grove bank was opened by means of that explosive.

In view of her relationship with the two men who visited her husband just before the bank robbery, officers are positive that Mrs Snyder is able to aid them materially in solving the mystery. When she visited Hillsboro on Sunday she convinced those with whom she talked that she knew far more of the crime than she has ever told. Unable to resist the desire to visit Oregon, on October 1st, 1906: her old home, she went to Hillsboro Sunday. Officers were expecting her. They questioned her so close-ly, however, that she quickly realized the value they placed on her testimony and quietly left the town Sunday evening. Washington county officials succeeded in locating her in this city by long distance telephone that evening and to Acting Coroner Badgely she promised to return on Monday. She failed to do so, however, and a subpoena was issued by the district attorney.
