—Miss Pauline Kline left this noon via the Westside for Portland.

—Mrs. W. L. Patterson of Baker City, left today for Carlton, for a visit with her sister, Mrs. Morrison.

—After a month's visit in Corvallis, Mrs. Frank Lilly and little daughter left today for her home at LaGrande.

—Marion Hayden has been appointed guardian of the minor heirs of Jasper Hayden, with bonds fixed at \$2,400.

—In the assessment of the C. & E. in Benton, the valuation is \$4,000 per mile, instead of \$8,000 as appeared in Wednesday's Times.

—Ray M. Walker of Independence has been visiting Corvallis and college friends for the past two days.

—William Knotts has been appointed guardian of the estate of Sarah A. Robinson. The property in the estate consists of 1.020 acres of land valued at \$8,000.

—In the James P. McBee estate Ivy May McBee has been appointed administratrix. The inventory has been filed as follows: Personal property \$18,799; real, \$33,457; total \$52,250. The sum of \$100 per month has been set aside for the use of the widow and minor children for one year. She has been authorized to sell the personal property at private sale.

—The Henkle & Davis mercantile establishment is to have a new home. In ten days or two weeks the stock and fixtures will be moved into the room next door south of the First National bank' formerly occupied by Nolans. Mr. Henkle of the firm is now in Portland on business connected with the removal. So far, no tenant for the room to be vacated by Henkle & Davis has been announced. Street rumors that Mr. Hinkle is retiring from the firm are not true.

—The Maccabees, kept open house Wednesday evening. The occasion was the visit of State Commander J. W. Sherwood of Portland. A large crowd was in attendance. The programme included an address by Mr. Sherwood, a recitation by Miss Lewis and a pia o solo by Mrs. E. E. Jackson. The order in this city is in a flourishing condition.

—Many improvements have been made to the residence property on the southeast corner of the block north of the Jacobs home on Third street. The interior of the house has been completely remodeled, the exterior has been painted, a cement walk has been added, and the lawn put into condition. The property is owned by Mr. Armstrong, father of Mrs. Kaupisch.

—Work has commenced on the new German Lutheran church. It is to occupy lots immediately east of the McKellips house. The foundation is rapidly rounding into shape, and the lumber is being hauled. It is said that the presence of such a church in town will attract many German families of the best class. The Leder Brothers and Mr. Ghortner are at the head of the movement for establishing the local congregation.

—Professor P. O. Bonebrake, P. D., who has been residing for about a year at Philomath, has been appointed pastor of the Philomath College congregation for the remainder of the conference year. He has been appointed to fill the place to which Rev. Fitz, of Ohio, was assigned by the last conference but who has been unable to move to the coast. Prof. Bonebrake was formerly president of Philomath College, and more recently was at the head of Campbell College, an institution operated in Kansas by the United Brethren church.

—The marriage of Miss Iva Mason and Mearl Staines was solemnized at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Mason, near Philomath Wednesday. The knot was tied by Elder Jones. The groom is a graduate of the normal department of Philomath College, in last year's class. He has entered the ministry and is to have a pastorate at Gravel Ford, Southern Oregon, where they will reside. The bride is the popular daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Mason. Mr. and Mrs. Staines left after the ceremony for Portland, to attend the wedding of the groom's sister.

—Mr. and Mrs. Emery Allen left yesterday to visit Mrs. Witt, sister of Mrs. Allen at Waitsburg, Washington. They will be absent a fortnight.

—Oscar Long of Benton, is to leave the 15th for Knoxville, Tennessee, to enter a medical college. He has been attending the medical department of Willamette University for the past three years, and he will finish this year at the Tennessee institution. He is to be accompanied by James Lane, his cousin of Harrisburg, who is to take a course in law.

—Captain C. E. Dentler of the 11th regiment U. S. A., well known in Corvallis, where he was formerly commandant at OAC, left on the 9th inst with his regiment for Cuba. Mrs. Dentler and children are at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, where for some time Captain Dentler has been attending officers school.

—The new home for the Corvallis postoffice is to be built by Salem contractors. They are the firm of Hughes & Headrick, the former of whom once resided in Job's addition. The Headrick in the firm is A. L. and the brother of our Grover. The foundation for the building is now being laid and the brick work will begin shortly. The contractors arrived from Salem yesterday.

—A third newspaper has been started in Corvallis. It is a seven column, four page weekly and is called the Benton County Republican. The publishers are W. Earl Smith, who left Blackfoot, Idaho, July 27th, and Milton Morgan of Corvallis. As its name signifies, the paper is republican in politics. The first number made its appearance this morning. Its regular publication day will be Thursday.

—All the preliminary negotiations have been arranged for a sale of the Flett livery barn at the corner of Third & Madison. The price fixed is \$3,800, and the seller is James Flett. The buyer is Charles Hout, and the delivery of the deed will take place as soon as the abstract title is determined to be regular. The property comprises two lots or 100 square feet of ground, and the livery stable situated thereon.

—Rev Gibbs, who is to be the new pastor of the M. E. church South, has arrived, and is to occupy the parsonage. He is a native of Tennessee, but has been for 17 years a resident of the Coast. For the past five years he has been officially related to Columbia college the educational institution of his denomination, and located at Milton Eastern Oregon. Rev. Ellison whom Mr. Gibbs succeeds at Corvallis goes to Peoria and McFarland district.

—Miss Louise Hecker, youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Hecker of Soap Creek, was married Wednesday to Leo Penners, of Salem. The ceremony was performed at 8:30 in the Catholic church at Salem, Rev. Father Moore officiating. Mr. and Mrs. Penners will make their future home in the capital city. The bride has a wide circle of friends on Soap Creek, where she has been a favorite in one of the oldest and best known pioneer families. The groom is a young man of excellent character and industrious habits.

—They had a big coyote chase out in the Bellfountain and Willamette foothills the other day with the result that there is one less varmint to death and destruction to the sheep and goat flocks in the vicinity. Many of the neighbors took part, having a pack of hounds in action as the chief reliance of the onslaught. Two coyotes were started and one of them was shot by Ellis Hammer in John Foster's pasture. The other fled into the hills pursued by the dogs but he succeeded in avoiding capture. About \$75 reward is what Mr. Hammer gets for knocking the coyote over, the neighborhood having joined in the offer of a reward of about that sum for every one of the varmints killed. Other chases and other coyotes are likely to result from the reward that has been hung up.
