GREAT INDUSTRIES

ENTERPRISE OF ONE STATE EQUALS WORLD'S WONDER.

Some Facts on Vast American Industries—Erie Canal Surpasses Suez—Canal to Be Deepened for Boats of 2000 Tons Burden—Other News.

Washington, Feb. 3.—Nowhere else on earth is there so wide a territory of absolute free trade as in the United States. No other nation produces so much from the ground. No other nation manufactures so much, and no other nation has people who can afford to buy as much or as good things. And our commerce, big as it is, is growing all the while. To show the increase in trade it is not necessary to take up the big things. Do you know that we spent \$15,000,000 for buttons last year? The statistics show that five concerns in the United States which produce steel pens exclusively have doubled their product in the short space of six years. It now requires upward of \$4,000,000 to pay even our annual bill for lead pencils.

The internal commerce of the United States is the largest trade movement in the world. This may sound big, but it is easy to prove. All the nations waited with suspense for news of the completion of the Suez canal, yet to enlarge and deepen the Erie canal, New York State provided \$101,000,000 in a single bond issue, more money than was required to build the famed Suez ditch, and nobody outside of New York seemed to think much of it. When the Erie is deepened and the capacity of its boats increased from 240 tons to 1000, there is already more commerce in sight for it than is now passing from the Mediterranean to the Red Sea. This is a fact that you ought to cut out and paste in your hat. Furthermore, the estimated cost of the Panama canal an undertaking which one nation failed to complete and which the United States has shouldered, is but little more than twice as much as it will take to complete the Erie Canal, for which only one of 46 states will pay. New York is going to do all this to maintain the supremacy of the port of Buffalo as a recipient of grain from Western fields on its way to New York City and the ports of the world.

New York ships more wheat and receives more wheat than any other

city in the world. A large portion of this grain has previously been collected at Buffalo. Next to New York, Portland, Or., at the other end of the American empire, ships more wheat than any other city here or abroad. Portland leads all the world in the shipment of lumber, and on account of being situated near the great uncultivated forests, it will probably lead in lumber production for many years to come.

Volumes would be required to give the details of the manufactures of this country, but there are some instances in which particular cities excel. Troy, New York, manufactures nearly 90 per cent. of the collars and cuffs made in the United States. There are 17,000 wage earners in that city who make their living by manufacturing our collars for us. Troy owes the collar business by the divine right of discovery. In 1828 Ebenezer Brown started there the first collar factory on earth. The early patterns were tied about the neck with a string. Six years later laundering was begun in connection with the business, and the stiff collar and "biled" shirt were born into the world of commerce. However, we Americans still use millions of shirts of the "hickory" variety, which are forever innocent of a laundered collar.

Grand Rapids, Mich., is famed for furniture. A unique feature of furniture-making and selling in the Michigan City is the semi-annual fair which is held there each January and July. It lasts an entire month and is attended by not only thousands of buyers from the different states in the Union, but from foreign countries as well. Grand Rapids owes its supremacy in this line to its proximity to the finest hardwood forests on the continent and to the fact that it "got there first." It has 43 large factories which give employment to 15,000 skilled workmen. Another peculiarity of the Grand Rapids industry is that most of the workmen are a second generation of skilled Dutch artisans who are so regular and orderly in their habits and ways of thinking that they cannot be induced to participate in strikes.

TRIAL OF HARRY THAW

PRISONER'S WIFE REVEALS STANFORD WHITE'S PERFDITY.

To Save Her Husband, White's Victim Tells Heart's Secrets Showing Murdered Man a Morel Monster and Villain—Delmas' Victory.

When court finally convened this morning the courtroom was packed with scores of women. With the completion of the preliminaries Delmas' loud voice said: "Call Mrs. Evelyn Nesbit Thaw." A second afterward, through a side door, came Thaw's wife, slight but erect, head bowed, the face pale and figure trembling. Delmas directed the witness to tell of the first meeting with White, just as she told it to Thaw. Evelyn said a chorus girl named Goodrich in August, 1901, asked her to a luncheon party where she would meet White.

Witness said her mother consented and with a friend took a cab and went to a studio on West Twenty-Fourth street. Witness said the doors seemed to open themselves.

"We went up stairs," said Evelyn, "and when we got there met the man who was introduced as Stanford White. I thought him an ugly man. There was a table set for four. Another gentleman came later. I remember White teased me about my hair, which I wore down my back, and my short skirt, which reached only to my shoe tops.

After supper we went up two flights of stairs into a room where there was a large red velvet swing. White put me in the swing and swung me very hard. When he swung me once very hard one foot crashed through a very large Japanese umbrella which hung from the ceiling."
