—Last Saturday representatives of the Hazelwood Creamery Company, of Portland, were in Philomath negotiating with citizens with reference to establishing a branch creamery at that point. The project was deemed feasible enough that the company will send a promoter to the community this week to make a canvass to determine how many farmers will patronize the creamery in case it is located at Philomath. It is understood that the company will install the creamery if the lacteal product of 300 cows can be secured to start the business.

BIG GRANITE COLUMNS.

Now in Position at the Entrance of Johnson Bank Building—Cost Seven Hundred.

The granite columns have been placed in position at the entrance of the Johnson bank building. They are very handsome and will greatly enhance the beauty of the entrance, adding a finish to the structure that will give it more the character of a city building than what is usually seen in a country town. The two columns cost \$700. They are of red granite, and came from Maine. They are eighteen inches in diameter, and including the base are 12 feet five inches long. Their weight is 8,500 pounds.

They were lifted into position by means of a derrick, and the process attracted much attention, a large crowd of people standing around to see how the thing was done. The effect is generally admired, as is the whole appearance of the building as it is gradually unfolded with the continued work. When completed, it will be the star adornment of Corvallis. It will be about three months before the building is ready for occupancy.

and showed me all that he wanted me to say. He told me that what I said about the Tyler and Boule murders was only taken with the idea of making a strong chain of evidence to convict the officers of the Western Federation of Miners. He wanted the names of the officers of the Federation used as much as possible all through the confession. McFarland asked me if I knew Ed Boyce. I told him I did not, and knew nothing of any money being sent to him. All the statements regarding money were made with the idea of implicating the Western Federation. Two or three days later Warden Whiteley brought the confession for me to sign."

Adams confirmed all the early part of the confession as to his family and past history, but denied that part relating to the plot to kill ex-Governor Steunenberg and as to his life in the Marble Creek country. He will be cross-examined by the state this afternoon and a lively ordeal may occur.

Portland, March 1.—Portland Telegram: The existence of an organized gang of young boys who have been doing petty thieving extensively on the East Side, in the vicinity of the central school, has been discovered by Detective Clifford Hellyer, and the names of nine of the party have been turned over to the authorities of the Juvenile court.

For weeks residents on East Burnside, East Ankeny, East Ash and other streets in the vicinity of the Central school have been losing quantities of food stuffs, canned fruit, apples, vegetables, tools and other articles of small value. Only a few nights ago the cellar of J. B. Tanner, on East Eighth street, was broken into, and a quantity of canned fruit was stolen.

Detective Hellyer traced the thefts to two lads attending the Central school. From them he learned of an organization including about a dozen lads varying in age from 12 to 16 years. The two lads confessed that the members of this band had been doing all the petty thieving complained of in their vicinity; that they stayed out at night; threw rocks at people and houses just for fun, and had a tent in a vacant lot where they would gather, after a foraging expedition, and feast upon the booty.

Los Angeles, Cal. March 2.—Bread is soon to be sold by weight in Los Angeles and the price regulated accordingly by the city. The council is about to pass an ordinance specifying the number of ounces a 10 cent loaf and a five cent loaf shall weigh. The exact figures are not yet fixed. Councilman Healy, who had the ordinance prepared believes many users of the staff of life have been imposed upon and not given their money's worth, and he wants every purchaser to know just what he is buying. Bakers are not enthusiastic about the measure.
