contempt." "No, sir," replied Judge Dunne; "there will be no stay," and turned abruptly away.

Immediately after adjournment of Judge Dunne's court, Mr. Shortridge was given into the custody of a deputy sheriff, who accompanied the lawyer to his office, where Mr. Shortridge's law partners at once prepared an application to the district court of appeals for a writ of habeas corpus to save him from going to jail.

Within half an hour after the filing of the writ was granted and made returnable at two o'clock. It was announced that P. F. Dunne, a prominent local attorney, would represent Mr. Shortridge in the habeas corpus proceedings.

Judge Dunne continued the Ruef-Dinan perjury case to Monday morning for argument on demurrer.

New York, March 8.—D. M. Delmas, chief counsel for Harry K. Thaw, when court opened this morning, officially announced that the defense rested its case and would offer no more evidence. District Attorney Jerome at once requested an adjournment until Monday in order to prepare evidence in rebuttal. Delmas agreed to the request and the trial adjourned until Monday.

It is reported that Jerome has determined to recall Evelyn N. Thaw to the stand in order to introduce certain letters in evidence. She cannot be recalled in rebuttal of her own testimony. It is also announced that May McKenzie, Evelyn's friend, will be called as the first witness for the state.

The Countess of Yarmouth will also be called by the state. The countess knew much of the couple's sojourn in Europe.

Thaw is vexed by the delay. Upon returning to his cell he fumed and abused Jerome for causing what he termed an unnecessary delay.

Learning from Mrs. Thaw's own testimony that she and young Jack Barrymore had once been sweethearts, Jerome dispatched a trusty henchman to the little resort near Boston, where Barrymore is in retirement, with instructions to draw from that young man anything of a derogatory character of which he possessed the knowledge.

The henchman obeyed. He proceeded to the resort, and there, it is said, put to Barrymore a question which caused the actor to slap the deputy's face and then propel him by the shoulders and propel him by aid of his boot down the stairs. Also, it is stated, Barrymore requested the deputy between kicks to inform William Travers Jerome that he would receive similar treatment if he asked the same question.
