

The regular services will be held at the United Evangelical church both morning and evening next Sunday.

Prof. Boughton, of McMinnville College, a strong pulpiteer, will occupy the pulpit morning and evening Sunday at the Baptist church.

Corvallisites who travel the Philomath road between Corvallis and Philomath, are agreeably surprised at its excellence. The jaunt by private conveyances between the two towns is over a hard and comparatively dry highway, one that, for winter time, is a credit to the county and the supervisors.

B. F. Hyland is to be buried this afternoon in Odd Fellows cemetery. He crossed the plains and settled in Benton in 1852, but later returned via the Isthmus to Vermont, his native state. In 1874 he returned to Corvallis, where he has since resided. He died Wednesday Morning, of dropsy. He was born in 1829. His wife died several years ago. Gene Hyland, a son, resides in Tacoma.

The morning subject at the Methodist church Sunday is, "My Saviour's Anguish," evening, "My Saviour's Triumph." During the week the pulpit will be occupied as follows: Tuesday, Rev. Saliek, of Salem; Wednesday, Rev. McDougall, of Albany; Thursday, Rev. Bonebrake of Philomath; Friday, Rev. Douglas, of Independence.

Davis Everett of Salem, Wednesday; Rev. F. E. Billington of Cottage Grove, Thursday, and Prof. E. C. Wigmon of the Eugene Divinity School, will speak Friday evening on "The Symmetrical Christian." The occasion of these special services is the close of the first year of the present pastorate.

The thirteenth annual session of the Oregon conference of the United Evangelical church meets here in Corvallis on April 4-8, the sessions to be held in the local United Evangelical church. About 60 delegates will be in attendance and they will arrive on Wednesday, April 3d, and the Conference Missionary Society holds forth in an afternoon and evening service. The conference will be presided over by Bishop W. F. Hall of Highland Park, Ill. He will speak on Wednesday afternoon and will preach Sunday morning and evening. This is the session at which the preachers are given their appointments for another year.
