### School District to Forfeit School Fund.

The board of directors of the several school districts in the country, are hereby notified that the new school law which goes into effect May 25th, 1907, provides that any part of the 85 percent of the general school fund of each district which must be paid for teachers salaries remaining on hand at the end of the school year or the 3rd Monday in June, will be forfeited. This law repeals the original law allowing each district to hold over \$50 each year. Each district should therefore see to it that no part of this fund is forfeited but spent for the purpose for which it is intended. Having no discretion in the dogs. matter the law will be enforced strictly.
