Tae greatest loss of life occurred in the diner, which seems to have been filled with passengers. Not a person in this car escaped death. The do med passer gers were carried into close contact with the engine, buried under the cars that came behind, and for the most part scalded to death.

In the baggage cir the baggageman was in antly killed. In the diner it is estimated that 14 passengers, three colored waiters, the Pullman conductor and a brakeman met death, and that sev ral victims were passengers in the sleepers. Two coaches did not leave the track, and apparently none of their passengers

was injured. There were 145 people on the wrecked train. A report from San Luis Obispo gives as the cause of the wreck the fact that a railroad crew was engaged in repairing the track. The wrecked special approached without wa ning at a very high rate of speed and the track
