## KILLED BY A BANDIT

CAR CONDUCTOR C. L. NEVIUS THE VICTIM OF HIGHWAYMAN.

Motorman Hull Wounded—Hold-up on New Rose City Park Line Ends in Murder—Carmen Fight the Robber.

Conductor C. L. Nevius was shot and killed and Motorman B. L. Hull was shot through the right hand in a battle with a lone bandit who held up car No. 136, on the Rose City Park branch of the East Arkeny street car line, at 9:40 last night. There were no passengers on the car.

After robbing the conductor of his day's receipts the highwayman ran away and is supposed to have boarded an eastbound freight train on the O. R. & N.

Conductor Nevius was with the motorman on the front end of the car, which had just left the end of the line, bound for Portland. Nevius was about to alight when a masked man boarded the front end of the car.

Upon seeing that the supposed passenger was masked, Motorman Hull detached his controller and threw it at the head of the stranger. He missed, and the bandit drew his revolver, firing point blank at the motor man. The shot went wild, but Motorman Hull pretended he was hit and fell off the car on his back.

Meanwhile Conductor Nevius had retreated into the car, where the bandit now followed him, pointing his pistol at the conductor's head. The robber forced Nevius to produce his day's receipts, estimated to be between \$20 and \$30, and also took his chain holder and watch.

At this juncture, being unobserved, Motorman Hull picked up a heavy rock and as the robber came out of the car door threw it, striking him full in the chest. The desperado was felled by the blow, but quickly recovered and, seemingly confused, turned toward conductor Nevius and fired two shots at him, both taking effect in the region of the kidneys. The bullets ranged slightly upward and came out just below the last rib on either side.

After the conductor had fallen the bandit turned the gun towards Hull and fired twice, and ran hastily down the railway tracks toward the city. One of the bullets mangled Hull's right hand, two bones being shattered.

A few moments later an east-bound freight came puffing slowly up the grade out of Sullivan's Gulch. It is supposed the robber boarded this train.

The conductor's motorman then hurried to the aid of his stricken comrade and endeavored to assist him to the car, but before he could gain his feet the badly wounded conductor gave a gasp and was dead.

Calling a man from a nearby cabin, the motorman then assisted in lifting the body of Nevius to the car platform and with his left hand started the car for the East Twenty-Eighth street turn for assistance. Arriving at Twenty-Eighth street and Sandy Road, an outbound car was encountered, which was manned by the motorman J. E. Hull, brother of the murdered man, and conductor C. L. Clinger, who immediately reversed their car and towed the car bearing the dead man to the barn.

As the bandit fell off the car, after being struck by the rock, the robber dropped Nevius' chainholder and watch, which Motorman Hull recovered.

Phoenix, Ariz., May 28.—The body of Nicolai de Raylan, whose case has been the subject of dispute and litigation since last December, was exhumed yesterday afternoon and taken to an undertaker's parlor, where the facts of the disinterment were made known upon the arrival late today of Baron von Schlippenbach, the Russian consul at Chicago, accompanied by Samuel J. Schaeffer, attorney for Mrs. Anna D. Raylan.

The body was in a fine state of preservation and the face was entirely unchanged. When the white casket was opened the body was seen attired in a woman's white robe.

It had been previously announced

that the body would be exhumed on Thursday, but this date was anticipated by two days, it is said, to avoid publicity. Michael Feinberf representing Public Administrator Reddick, of Chicago, was present throughout the proceedings and expressed satisfaction.

Baron von Schlippenbach, after viewing the body a moment, said: "This is the body of Nicolai de Raylan, who was for 12 years my secretary."

Mr. Schaeffer has not yet seen the body.

The result of the inquest established beyond a doubt the identity of the corpse as the body of deRaylan and that the person in question was a female.

El Paso, May 28.—In spite of the fact that a similar charge was investigated and dismissed by a grand jury some time ago, another complaint has been filed with United States District Attorney Liewelin, of New Mexico, that a tribe of Indians in that territory is given to the worship of an enormous serpent to which is fed the new-born babes of a pueblo in which it is housed and carefully attended and guarded.

The complaint was filed by a Catholic priest, who alleges that a dozen families were so segregated from several Pueblos around about two years ago and formed into a Pueblo by themselves. That although it is known that many children have been born to these families not a child is to be found in the Pueblo. This led the priest to press his investigations with the result that he discovered in an adobe house, isolated and closely guarded, there is an enormous serpent, which is worshipped by the Indians of all the Pueblos around, and that every babe born in the small Pueblo, and it is suspected many others, are fed to the serpent. Major Liewelyn, having no jurisdiction, has filed the affidavit of the priest and other evidence with the territorial authorities.

San Francisco, May 27.—Tomorrow is the day set for the sentencing of Abraham Ruef on the charge to which he pleaded guilty two weeks ago of extorting \$1125 from proprietor Malfanti, of Delmonico's restaurant, on a threat to prevent the renewal of Malfanti's liquor license. But sentence will not be passed at this time. Ruef will appear, the prosecution will move the postponement of sentencing, and Judge Dunne will acquiesce. The prosecution prefers to delay Ruef's punishment until after he has appeared as a witness against the public service corporation officials, the mayor and others now indicted by the Oliver grand jury.

Twin Falls, Idaho, May 26.—Complaints were sworn out this evening by S. E. Rozell, whose daughter was killed by a tiger which escaped from its cage in the Sells-Floto circus last Saturday evening, against H. H. Tammen, J. F. Bonfils, Frank Tammen and Chris O'Neil, charging them with manslaughter. H. H. Tammen and J. F. Bonfils, proprietors of the Denver post, are the owners of the show. Frank Tammen is the traveling manager, and O'Neil is the head keeper of the animals.

It is also said that a civil suit for \$5000 damages will be filed by Rozell, in addition to the criminal proceedings.

It is presumed the action against H. H. Tammen and Bonfils will be taken in the United States court in Denver. The arrest of the other two men is expected tomorrow.

Hcquiam, Wash., May 28.—Warrants were issued today for the arrest of two clam-diggers of Moclips for robbing Indian graves of the Quinalt tribe. Over 25 Indians came to this city today and entered complaint against the ghoulish work. A warrant was sworn to by John Chepulis, a prominent Indian charging the miscreants with robbing the graves of his father and mother-in-law. Several saw the work done and informed the Indians. Speaking of the matter, John Chepulis said:

"Whiteman cannot rob the graves of our people and we won't stand it. Someday we catch them and an Indian will take his rifle and kill him. We want to stop this work before it comes to that."
