Low-carbon fuel standard vote set

SALEM — The Oregon Environmental Quality Commission will vote next week on low-carbon fuel standards aimed at reducing greenhouse gas emissions from vehicles.

Regulations proposed by the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality would require fuel importers and producers to reduce the carbon content of transportation fuel by 10 percent over the next decade.

To reach this goal, companies could blend more ethanol and biodiesel into gasoline and diesel, and eventually they would likely also have to purchase carbon credits. A system to generate carbon credits is also part of the proposal.

The low-carbon fuels program is a top priority for Democratic state lawmakers, who want to make it permanent. A 2009 law that granted authority for the state to create the program will expire in May unless legislators extend it.

According to the DEQ, low-carbon fuel standards will reduce greenhouse gas emissions in Oregon by approximately 7.3 million tons over the next decade.

California has already implemented low-carbon fuel regulations, and Washington Gov. Jay Inslee announced on Dec. 17 that he had asked the state's Department of Ecology to draft low-carbon fuel regulations.

In Oregon, the DEQ received more than 740 public comments on its low-carbon proposal, which is scheduled

for a vote at the Jan. 7 Oregon Environmental Quality Commission meeting.

Those opposed included the Canadian Fuels Association, Western States Petroleum Association, Oregon Trucking Associations, the Northwest Food Processors Association, Associated General Contractors, Chevron, Tesoro, the Oregon Farm Bureau and the Oregon Cattlemen's Association, according to a DEQ report.

One concern for the Oregon Farm Bureau was that although farm fuels are exempt from the regulations, it will be impossible to separate these from regulated fuels. The DEQ responded that will not be a problem, as long as farm fuel importers, producers and consumers keep records of their transactions.

Mario Cuomo dies

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — Mario Cuomo had a loud and liberal voice that inspired a generation of politicians to turn to public service, and a story of humble beginnings that he wove into calls for social justice during his three terms as New York governor and years as a national figure when he deflected overtures to become a presidential candidate.

Cuomo died at his home in Manhattan Thursday of natural causes due to heart failure, just hours after his son Andrew began his second term as New York's chief executive. He was 82.

The son of Italian immigrants, Mario Cuomo played minor league baseball before embarking on a legal and political career. His oratory and his dedication to progressive policies made him a political star, but despite calls to seek the White House, he never made a run for president.

Hours before his father's death, the younger Cuomo delivered an inaugural address in which he honored the Democratic stalwart.

"He is in the heart and mind of every person who is here," Andrew Cuomo said. "He is here and he is here, and his inspiration and his legacy and his experience is what has brought this state to this point. So let's give him a round of applause."

President Barack Obama telephoned Cuomo Thursday and offered his condolences. In a statement, the president called Mario Cuomo "a determined champion of progressive values, and an unflinching voice for tolerance, inclusiveness, fairness, dignity, and opportunity."

Cuomo served as New York governor

from 1983 through 1994 and became nationally celebrated for his ability to blend the story of his humble upbringing with ringing calls for social justice.

He was also known for the presidential races he stayed out of in 1988 and 1992. Cuomo agonized so publicly over whether to run for the White House that he was dubbed "Hamlet on the Hudson."

In 1991, Cuomo left a plane idling on the tarmac at the Albany airport rather than fly to New Hampshire and jump into the battle for the presidential nomination at the last minute. He left the door open for a lesser-known governor, Bill Clinton of Arkansas.

"When he placed my name in nomination at the 1992 Democratic Convention, he said government had 'the solemn obligation to create opportunity for all our people,'" the ex-president said in a joint statement with his wife, former U.S. secretary of state and U.S. Senator from New York, Hillary Rodham Clinton. "In his three terms as Governor of New York, he honored that obligation."

Cuomo's last public appearance came in November, when Andrew was re-elected governor of New York. The frail-looking patriarch and his son raised their arms together in victory at the election-night celebration.

Cuomo and his wife, Matilda, had three daughters and two sons. Andrew was New York's attorney general before becoming governor. His other son, Chris, is a CNN newscaster. Daughter Maria married designer Kenneth Cole. The other two daughters are Dr. Margaret I. Cuomo and Madeline Cuomo O'Donohue.

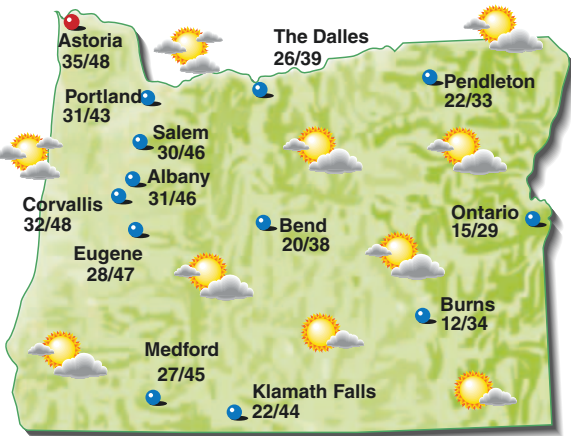

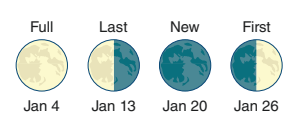

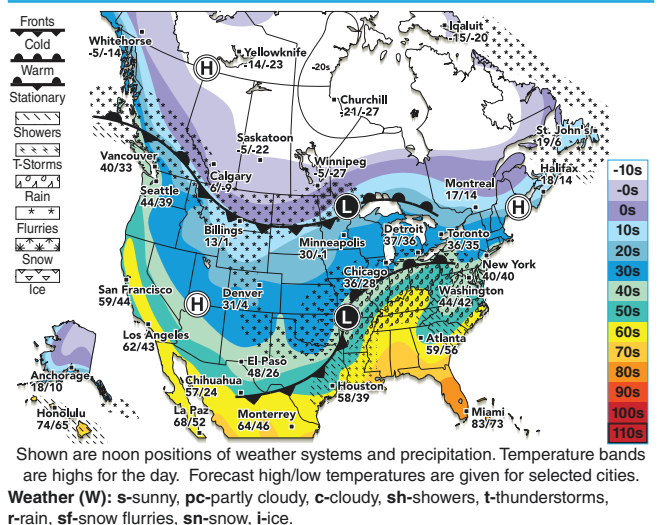

Bridge work continues next week

Next week the Oregon Department of Transportation continues work on the Astoria Bridge. The project involves recoating the steel below the bridge deck on U.S. Highway 101 at the Necamey Creek (Sam Reed) Bridge (Oregon Coast Highway, milepost 39.53).

Work includes the installation of containment structures and painting the bridge below the bridge deck. Flaggers control single-lane traffic from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Expect delays of up to 20 minutes.

Bridge rehabilitation work is being performed at both the Old Youngs Bay and Lewis

& Clark River bridges along U.S. Highway 101 Business (mileposts 4.78 and 6.89).

The scheduled work includes reconstruction of the Lewis & Clark River Bridge, which is now closed to facilitate construction activities. This full closure is anticipated to last until Aug. 1. A detour route is currently designated with signing.

The contractor is scheduled to resume bridge rehabilitation work at the Old Youngs Bay Bridge beginning the week of Jan. 12.

The Oregon State Police enforces the speed limit through the work zone areas.
