Groundhog named for Bill Murray in Michigan

TOWNSHIP, Mich. (AP) — Murray doesn't have good news for Michigan. But maybe she can try again tomorrow.

The 8-month-old female groundhog named after actor Bill Murray, whose movies include "Groundhog Day" about a man repeatedly reliving Feb. 2, predicted six more weeks of winter after seeing her shadow Monday morning at the Howell Conference and Nature Center.

She was standing in for Woody the Woodchuck, the state's official groundhog. Woody is recovering from a respiratory infection, center officials said.

Murray stayed in her house, which center staff members interpreted as a reluctance to emerge and see her shadow. The not-so-scientific forecast comes after a storm dropped 1½ feet of snow on parts of Michigan's Lower Peninsula.

"I think that given the deep snow we had to venture through this morning, she's probably right in her prediction," center spokeswoman April Gasbarre

She said Murray did a wonderful job filling in for her ailing colleague, who has been making bold and mostly correct predictions since 1999.

Murray's prediction falls in line with that of the day's most famous and furry prognosticator: Pennsylvania's Punxsutaw-





Establishing Al Mauro Construction, he began constructing and deconstructing. His fingerprints are found throughout Astoria and Clatsop County. No. 10 Sixth St., the Commodore Hotel, Liberty Theater and Central School illustrate just a few.

He found treasures along the way. When possible, he returned what he could to the original owners. He donated to the Flavel Museum and many established businesses in Astoria. This work, led him to Belfor, the world's largest restoration com-

pany. He traveled throughout the states and overseas, supervising crews in disaster relief. He was well respected and bettered the lives of co-workers and employees for 15

Al told a great story. He was always the gentleman. He was well known for his never-ending kindness and generosity. He was a treasure.
