Documents reveal overlap in Hayes' work

SALEM — More evidence of the overlap between the private business of first lady Cylvia Hayes and the public policies championed by Gov. John Kitzhaber emerged Friday, when the state Department of Administrative Services and the Governor's Office released hundreds of pages of public records requested by members of the media.

Emails released Friday reveal the close relationship between a group that hired Hayes and state employees working on an alternative measure of Oregon's progress on environmental, socioeconomic and other issues.

Hayes signed a \$25,000 contract with Demos, a New York-based policy group, in

Her work for Demos included "advising state and county leaders on implementation of GPI," or Genuine Progress Indicator, the specific indicator that Demos advocates for governments to adopt. Lew Daly, director of Demos' sustainable progress initiative, emailed a

document related to the GPI to Hayes in September 2013.

Once we polish it up, Cylvia, maybe you should forward it to the relevant group in the governor's office, for questions, etc.," Daly wrote.

Hayes waited until Jan. 8, 2014, then forwarded the email to Kitzhaber's chief of staff, Mike Bonetto, and Michael Jordan, director of the Department of Administrative Services.

Elektra Gray, director of communications for Demos, said in an emailed statement Friday that Hayes and Kitzhaber's support for the Genuine Progress Indicator predated Hayes' contract.

"Since 2010, Demos has brought together advocates, experts and public leaders to develop ways that governments can measure environmental and human well-being as well as economic output," Gray wrote. "Governor Kitzhaber has been an advocate for such alternative metrics since at least 2001, and Cylvia Hayes was a champion of the issue and sought Demos' technical assistance before any discussions about her consulting for Demos."

It was that experience, she

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said, that led Demos to hire Hayes "to help advance the idea in other states and nationally.

"Inasmuch as she and the governor have continued their commitment to new measures for progress in Oregon, it was outside of the scope of Demos' six-month consulting contract."

However, the emails released Friday revealed Hayes was actively involved in developing an Oregon GPI at the same time she worked for Demos

On Oct. 10, 2013, Hayes emailed Jordan with a job description for an employee the state would eventually hire to implement the GPI.

"Here are my thoughts on what the GPI Director will need to do," Hayes wrote. She went on to list "build stakeholder participation and support within and beyond state government," and "work with, leverage, learn from other state GPI efforts."

The Department of Administrative Services eventually hired an employee, Sean Mc-Guire, in March 2014 to fill the position Hayes described, according to records released by the Department of Administrative Services.

Kitzhaber asks for AG to investigate

SALEM — Gov. John Kitzhaber this morning asked Attorney General Ellen Rosenblum to investigate questions surrounding first lady Cylvia Hayes and her dealings with the administration.

Kitzhaber asked Rosenblum

to launch a "review" because of the media's focus on the overlap between Hayes' paid consulting jobs and her unpaid work as policy adviser, as well as the role of Kitzhaber associates in helping Hayes obtain some of those jobs. Public records released Friday revealed that Hayes directed state employees' work to adopt an economic indicator called the

Genuine Progress Indicator, at the same time she was paid by a New York-based group to advocate for governments to adopt that specific indicator.
