# Potter, an architect who served on the Astoria City Council, dies

Tom Potter, an architect who served on the Astoria City Council and was involved in the design of several notable buildings, died Monday. He was 77.

Potter represented Ward 4, which covers the east side of the city, for one term on the City Council from 1997 to 2000. The advocate for private property rights also served on the Planning Commission and the Historic Landmarks Commission.

"Everything he did like when he was on City Council and all of that, he did it for the community," said Catherine Stutznegger, one of Potter's three daughters. "He just enjoyed being here. He loved the area. He enjoyed the people. He had great friends."

Ann Potter, a bookkeeper who was Potter's wife of 47 years, died in 2013. Stutznegger said her father had a "broken heart. Just got tired; ready to go see Mom.'

According to Norman Stutznegger, Potter's son-inlaw, Potter was born in Wisconsin and graduated from Arizona State University after studying architecture. He came to Astoria in 1965.

As an architect, his son-inlaw said, Potter worked on the Columbia River Maritime Museum, Astoria Middle School, Clatsop Community College and the Astoria-Warrenton Area Chamber of Commerce.

Outspoken on private property rights, Potter was often a disruptive, contrary voice on the City Council who was skeptical of historic preservation mandates. He once moved a property line for a Social Security building he was designing in Uniontown 2 inches to avoid review by the Historic Landmarks Commission.

The modern Social Security building, which was painted bright orange, was constructed near a historic two-story home built in 1915. The city's historic preservation officer said at the time that while Potter's move was legal, it was not in keeping with the spirit or intent of the rules.

Former Mayor Willis Van Dusen angered preservationists when he appointed Potter Courtesy of Norm Stutznegger

to the Historic Landmarks Commission a few years after the architect left the City Council. Van Dusen argued that Potter would bring balance to the commission.

Potter cut an eccentric figure and was known for favoring black clothes and driving a Model A Ford.

His son-in-law said Potter had pattern blindness, which is why he was partial to black. He said Potter would often volunteer to drive people in the restored Model A at events.

"He was a very, very, very generous, civic-minded man," Norman Stutznegger said.

Potter is survived by daughters Catherine Stutznegger, Pauline Riutta and Jeanine Potter, five grandchildren and a sister and brother.

## **OBITUARIES Richard Clement Paulsen** Astoria July 26, 1920 — Feb. 3, 2015

Richard Clement Paulsen was born in Raymond, Wash., to Peter and Hilda Paulsen. They moved to Astoria in 1921, where his father owned and operated the Owl Drug Store with Mr. Frank Berg.

He graduated from AHS in 1938 and

went on to attend Oregon State College (now OSU). There he was affiliated with Beta Theta Pi fraternity, was in ROTC, and graduated from the school of pharmacy in 1942 with a BS degree.

He married his high school sweetheart, Myrtle L. Andersen, on July 19, 1942. They were married 70 years until her passing in 2012. They had four children together. He was a second lieutenant in the infantry during World War II. Returning home, he started working

for his father at the Owl Drug Store in 1946. Store from 1953 to 1973, when he sold it; C.P. Paulsen; seven grandchildren; and 12 later working for Gil Kamara Real Estate. In 1964 he took his family to visit relatives in Norway, and they spent time traversing Europe. In 1965 he was awarded the George Award from the Astoria Chamber of Commerce for his role in organizing buses for the Save Our Salmon excursion to Salem. He served on many local boards and com-

mittees, among them: as a city councilman, on the Selective Service Board, in the Rotary Club, a member of Astoria Golf & Country Club (where he served on the board of directors three times), a member of First Lutheran Church (where he was a councilman and

established an endowment fund), a member of Clatsop County Historical Society, a member of Columbia River Maritime Museum, and a member of Oregon State Pharmaceutical Association.

He was past president of the YMCA and a member of the Sons of Norway Lodge. He was chairman of the first very successful Heart Fund drive, he donated to the Liberty Theatre's restoration and he donated to the Astoria Column restoration.




