Nancy Lee Grimberg
Astoria
Sept. 22, 1928 — March 23, 2015

Nancy Lee Grimberg was born Sept. 22, 1928, in Portland, Ore., to Ole and Nettie (Lokan) Nelson. She spent her early years on a homestead in Birkenfeld, then Clatskanie, and moved to Astoria at the age of 10. Nancy resided in Astoria until the end of her life. She had so much love for this place.

She graduated from Astoria High School in 1946, attended Oregon State University for a year, and majored in fashion design.

In 1954, Nancy married Stanford Grimberg in Astoria. Five years later their only child was born, a daughter they named Ann. Stan and Nancy remained together until his death, caused by mesothelioma, in 1982.

Nancy spent a total of 23 years working for The Daily Astorian in the advertising department. In 1976, she went to work with Stan at the new business he had established, Astoria Plumbing. Nancy ran the business until retirement in 2000. She spent years volunteering at the Columbia River Maritime Museum, Astoria Column, and SMART Reading Program. She was a member of Beta Sigma Phi sorority for over 60 years, VASA Lodge, and the Elks, where she rarely missed a Friday night Bingo.

Nancy was a gifted seamstress, and will fondly be remembered for altering every item of clothing she ever owned. She had a tenacity that few could match. She was passionate about jobs and industry. She never

hesitated to pick up the phone, or write a strongly worded letter to support a cause that she believed in. Nancy was generous and had a sense of humor. She kept that sense of humor until the very end. Spending time with her great-grandson Keegan, brought her much joy.

Nancy is survived by her daughter, Ann Samuelson and son-in-law, David Samuelson, of Jewell; her nephew, John Nelson of Eugene; her granddaughters, Kristin Samuelson of Portland and Sarah Samuelson of Chandler, Ariz.; and her great-grandson, Keegan McCleary of Portland. Nancy's companion, Marvin Mathre of Seaside, also survives.

She was preceded in death by her husband, Stan Grimberg; brother Gene Nelson; companion, Walt Larson; and lifelong friend, Sue (Kearney) Haskins.

A public graveside service will be held at 1 p.m. on Saturday, March 28, 2015, at Ocean View Cemetery in Warrenton. A reception honoring Nancy follows at the Barbey Maritime Center, 2042 Marine Drive in Astoria.

Harley Albert Sproul
Prineville

Harley Albert Sproul was born to Henry and Viola Sproul in Cottage Grove, Ore., on July 1, 1923. He spent most of his childhood in Goldendale and Battle Ground, Wash., and graduated from Vale High School near the Oregon-Idaho border.

Shortly after he graduated, he enlisted in the U.S. Coast Guard during World War II. He served time in the Philippines, as well as experiencing a typhoon that almost sank his ship off the coast of Okinawa, Japan. During this time, he and Margery Loraine Sproul were married on Aug. 12, 1944, and went on to create a big family. They had five boys and one girl, all of whom have continued the dedicated work ethic and strong family bond that Harley and Marge instilled in them from a very young age.

After the military, he worked for his father-in-law in Agate Beach, Ore., at a rock shop, which spurred his love for precious stones. He was a skilled jewelry maker, and it became his favorite pastime, which led to an abundant rock collection. He also worked as a longshoreman for a short period of time, and eventually became a heating and oil technician. While residing in Astoria, where five of his six children went to high school, he owned his own business called Hing, that he named after himself and his eldest son.

He was very involved in his family, church, and community. He and Marge faithfully attended every sporting event possible, and held great pride in their children's accomplishments. They both went on a mission to Lame Deer, Mont., in the late 1980s, where they worked on a Cheyenne Native American Indian reservation, and he was involved with their youth boys basketball group.

All throughout his life, Harley was an avid hunter and fisherman. A true outdoorsman, who spent most of his retired days in

Prineville, Ore., on a lake with his pole and tackle box. He loved recruiting newcomers, and had incredible patience with people of all ages. His love for nature was passed down from generation to generation, and continues to be a family tradition.

Harley and Margery were married for nearly 60 years before she passed away. He later remarried, to Elaine Thompson of Prineville. He was preceded in death by his first wife, Margery Sproul; his second wife, Elaine Sproul; and his three siblings, Chester, Ruth, and Gertrude.

He is survived by his six children, Rodney Sproul and his significant other, Karen Berg; Latona and her husband, John Minish; Dale and his wife, Leah Sproul; Jay Sproul; Robert and his wife, Donna Sproul; and Fred Sproul. He has eight grandchildren, Stephanie and her husband, Lyle Jones; Blaine "Crittter" Sproul and his fiancée, Holly Mizer; Rebecca and her husband, Chuck Broadbent; Mandy Sproul; Melissa Minish and her fiancé, Joel Faries; Vincent and Kaitlin Sproul; and Carly Sproul.

He also has six great-grandchildren, Kaylee and Coleston Jones; and Jakob, Emmalee, Tate, and Spencer Broadbent. He is also survived by his three siblings, Don, Edgar, and Dorothy.

The public viewing will be held at Prineville Funeral Home at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday, March 28, located at 199 N.E. 10th St., Prineville, OR 97754.

The burial ceremony will be at 10:15 a.m. at Juniper Haven Cemetery, 1555 N. Main St., Prineville, OR 97754, which will have military service honors performed by the Prineville Band of Brothers Honor Guard, and will be immediately followed by a potluck reception at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

The official memorial service will start at 1 p.m.

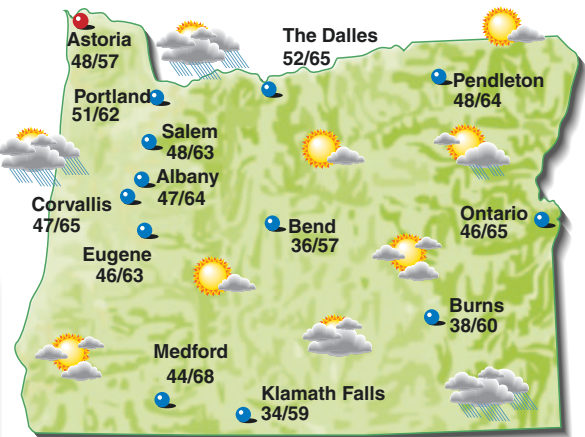

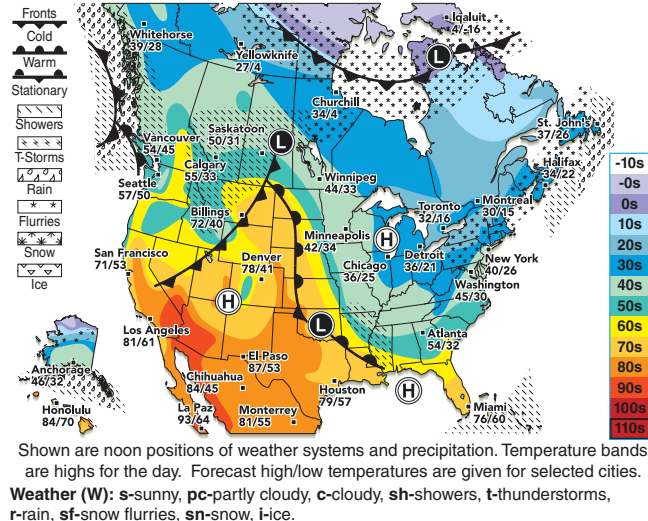
