Double play helps save the day for Warriors

WARRENTON — The Naselle and Warrenton baseball teams hooked up in a defensive battle Thursday afternoon at Huddleston Field — until a couple of defensive plays turned the tide in Warrenton's favor.

The Warriors ultimately won the nonleague contest, 4-0, behind some stellar pitching from Brock Johnson and Joe Little, along with a timely double play.

With Johnson, Little and Naselle's Skyler York battling in a scoreless pitcher's duel through four innings, the game came down to a few plays in the field in the fifth inning.

Naselle opened the top of the fifth with line drive hits by sophomore Jacob Scrabbeck and eighth-grader Cole Dorman.

Scrabbeck's hit found open space in center field; Dorman's line drive found the glove of Warrenton second baseman Jake Holthusen, who made a diving catch and tagged Scrabbeck for an unassisted double play.

Instead of two runners on and no outs, the Comets had two outs and nobody on.

"Any threat they had, that took it away," said Warrenton coach Lennie Wolfe. "Joe (Little) came in and he was leaving the ball up a little, but Jake did a great job of taking care of his teammate, and it was a heck of a play.

"I was very pleased with the pitching and defense the whole game."

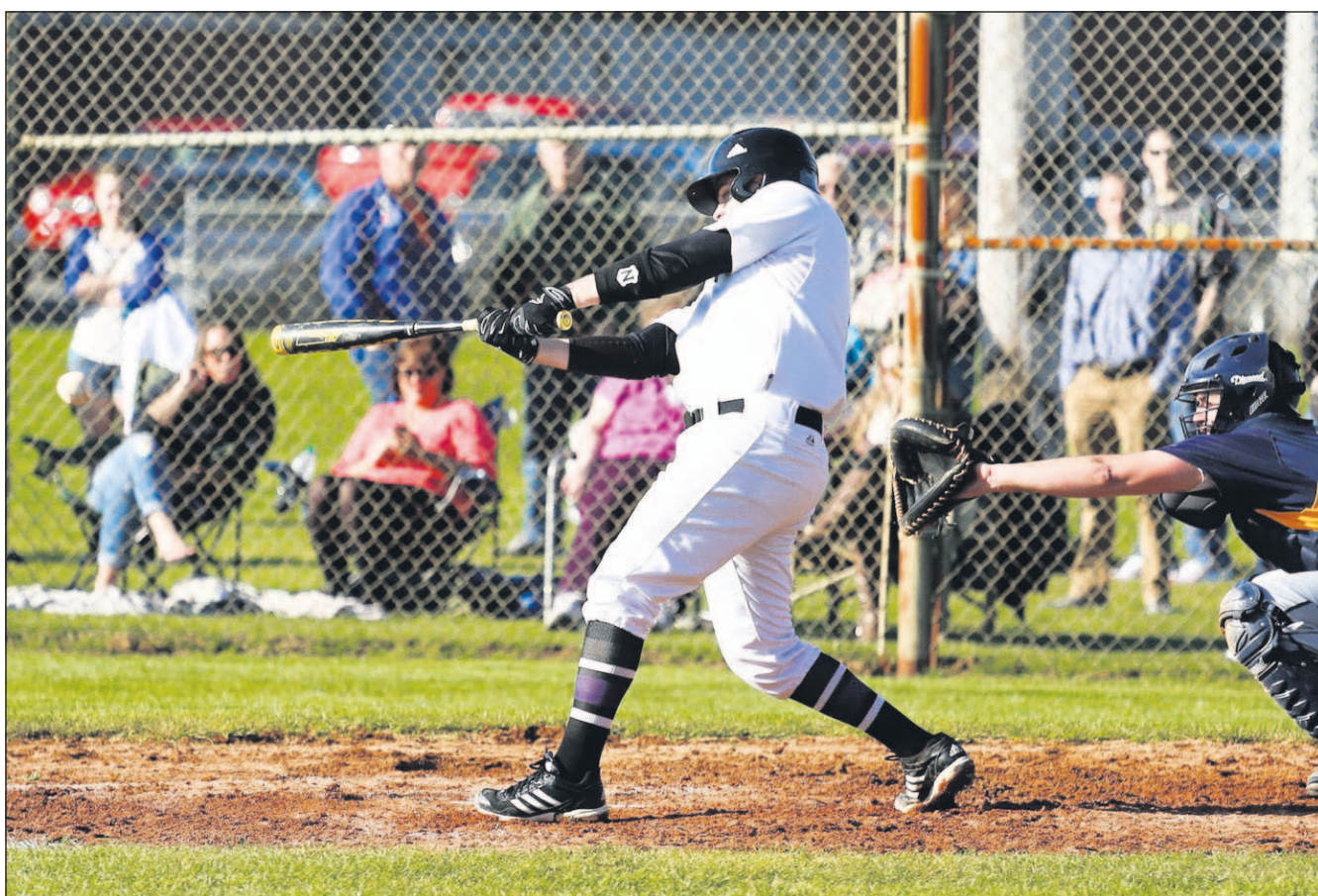
The other key defensive plays came in the bottom of the fifth, and went in Warrenton's favor.

The Comets dropped a routine fly ball by Hunter Michaelson to start the inning, and a few more "routine" outs turned into three Naselle errors in the inning.

Courtesy runner Anthony Cochran scored on a base hit by Hunter Wilson, and an errant throw on a bunt by Drake Fischer allowed another run to score. Fischer reached second on the play, on an errant throw to the plate.

"We did some good things," Wolfe said. "We laid bunts down and put some pressure on. We were playing for one run, and as it turned out, we got two."

fensive plays continued in the sixth, when Eric Lund drew a leadoff walk, but was thrown out at second by Warrior catcher Gavon McFadden on an attempted steal.

In the bottom of the sixth, Michaelson belted a one-out, solo home run to left field for a 3-0 lead.

McFadden reached third on a bad throw to first, and scored moments later when a return throw to the pitcher got away, allowing McFadden to sprint home.

York retired the first 12 batters he faced, and finished with three hits allowed, seven strikeouts and no walks.

"The York kid threw well," Wolfe said. "We executed maybe just a bit

better. That's a good team. They'll win games."

Johnson and Little combined for three strikeouts and a walk, with three hits allowed, two by Scrabbeck.

"Everyone was on a low pitch count today," said Wolfe, whose team is scheduled to play a two-game series with Regis today and Saturday.

"Brock gave us four innings, when honestly I thought I'd get two or maybe three," Wolfe said. "His pitch count was ridiculously low after two innings (nine pitches). He ended up below the total I had set aside for him."
