Seaside's senior class ready for big year

It's the "last lap" around the track, so to speak, for a very talented senior class of athletes at Seaside.

The Gulls enter the 2015 track season with a good mix of youth and experience, as the "new era" athletes prepare to replace the old guard.

But the seniors aren't finished yet.

Several senior athletes have high hopes, and are set to finish their prep careers in Eugene, May 22 and 23.

"Danielle, Kelly, Allison, Charlotte, Amber Nofield — that group is very strong," said Seaside coach Jeff Kilday, referring to Danielle and Kelly Willyard, Allison Kilday and Charlotte Blakesley.

Those athletes were already winning events in the early season meets.

"Behind that, we have Josie Smith, Lizzy Barnes, and junior Bridgette Malone was third in the hurdles last year," coach Kilday said. "We should have good relays, and we'll compete. The girls have a very strong senior class, with a couple real good juniors and a sophomore — it should be a great team"

Overall, he said, "our numbers are down a little. Not very many freshmen this year. We have 63 altogether, a little bit lower than we normally have, but I think they're all great athletes."

For the Seaside boys, "We lost a couple great distance runners, but we have a sophomore and junior class that's working its way up," Kilday said. "They're a lot stronger. The boys should compete this year; with

the girls it's about numbers."

Valley Catholic has joined the Cowapa League, and the Valiant boys "will make a huge difference," Kilday said. "They have a great team — they won the (3A) state meet last year."

But make no mistake — the Gulls will be scoring lots of points in the big meets.

"We have some new blood in there for the distance team — a lot of 400-meter runners — so I think our 4x4 team will be good," Kilday said. "Taylor (Barnes), Juneau (Meyer), maybe Rafi (Sibony), Marshal (Ferre) ... some great runners. Jackson (Januik) and Hunter (Thompson) will also be there. From the 400 on, we look very strong."

New coaches take over Seaside softball

The ups and downs of Seaside softball. Unfortunately for the Gulls, it's been mostly down for the last decade.

After 0-15 league seasons in 2007, 2009 and 2012, Seaside softball appeared to be on its way back up following a 4-11 record in 2013.

But last year, it was back to 0-15.

The Lady Gulls have changed coaches, as Jon Hotchkiss and Bill Westerholm take over.

Even with a couple of freshmen pitchers, the new-look Lady Gulls believe they can compete in the new-look Cowapa.

"I think we'll be competitive this year," Westerholm said. "In the past, it just seemed like they were one player short, or one position short. We have 11 or 12 girls who can fill a position and push each other to get better.

And the Gulls have talented, well-qualified players elsewhere, including senior infielders Brianna Babbitt and Shelby Miller; and junior shortstop Whitney Westerholm.

The sophomores include Lucy Bodner, Mica Parnell and Sydney Villegas, with freshmen pitchers Jetta Ideue and Sequoia Shand, along with freshman infielder/outfielder Bryre Babbitt.

"We'll just worry about ourselves," said coach Westerholm. "Banks is going to be strong because they've

got pitching, and they had a lot of youth players last year who saw time. Yamhill's out of the league, so that helps; the Scappoose softball program has been strong for the last four or five years, and they've got good pitching."

With that being said, Westerholm said, "I think we could fight for that third spot."
