

Debut: 'We played errorless ball'

"His teams are always going to play smart, they're going to hit the ball through the lineup and he's going to have pitchers who can throw," he said. "You have to play well to beat his team, and that's what we did."

"We played errorless ball, and some of the defensive plays we made saved ourselves some runs," Gasser said.

"Samboy Tuimato throws a runner out at first (from right field, in the first inning); Ryan Palek does the splits at first to make an out; Kyle (Strange) throws a guy out from his knees (fifth inning); Joe Brawley ran down a fly ball in left-center that takes away a hit; and Fritz (Fremstad) makes a diving catch at short. We saved ourselves the runs that made up the difference in the score."

Offensively, run-scoring

singles by Astoria's Bronson Holthusen and Palek gave the Fishermen a 2-0 lead in the second inning.

North Marion answered with a four-run rally in the fourth, in which the Huskies had a leadoff walk, followed by back-to-back doubles (Emry Patterson and Jordan Kendall), another walk, and a two-out double by Nat Barrell to score Dylan Doubrava for a 4-2 lead.

The Fishermen didn't "win the inning," as they like to say, but they didn't lose it, either.

Brawley had a leadoff walk to start the bottom of the fourth, followed by a single to left from Tuimato, and Kai Brown reached safely on a bunt to load the bases.

One out later, Jasyn Gohl laid down a perfect squeeze bunt to score Brawley, with Gohl reaching safely on the play.

Carter Wallace followed with a two-run single off North

Marion's freshman starter on the mound, Trevor Ensign.

A sacrifice bunt by Fremstad brought in Gohl for the fourth run of the inning and a 6-4 lead.

The Huskies added a run in the fifth, but a defensive meltdown by North Marion in the sixth helped the Fishermen tack on another run.

A fly ball by Fremstad dropped untouched in shallow center field; an errant throw allowed Strange to reach base; and moments later another error allowed Nick Scott to reach first and Fremstad to score.

The Fishermen had 10 hits off two North Marion pitchers. The first nine hits were singles from nine different players. Fremstad had the 10th hit for Astoria's only multiple hitter.

Brown, Wallace and Fremstad combined on the mound for one strikeout and five walks, with six hits allowed.

Pet Rock creator Gary Dahl dies

JACKSONVILLE (AP) — Gary Ross Dahl, the creator of the wildly popular 1970s fad the Pet Rock, has died at age 78 in southern Oregon.

Dahl's wife, Marguerite Dahl, confirmed Tuesday that her husband of 40 years died March 23 of chronic obstructive pulmonary disease.

The smooth stones came packed in a cardboard box containing a tongue-in-cheek instruction pamphlet for "care and feeding." Dahl estimated he had sold 1.5 million of them at roughly \$4 each by the time the fad fizzled. The Pet Rock required no work and no time commitment.

Born Dec. 18, 1936, in Bontineau, N.D., Dahl was raised in Spokane, Wash.

In 1975, he was a Los Gatos, Calif., advertising executive when he came up with the Pet Rock idea.

Dahl also penned "Advertising for Dummies."

In 2000, he was a grand prize winner in the Bulwer-Lytton Fiction Contest for dreadful prose. His winning entry: "The heather-encrusted Headlands, veiled in fog as thick as smoke in a crowded pub, hunched precariously over the moors, their rocky elbows slipping off land's end, their bulbous, craggy noses thrust into the thick foam of the North Sea like bearded old men falling asleep in their pints."

He and his wife retired and moved to Jacksonville in 2006.

The Pet Rock craze "was great fun when it happened," his wife recalled in a telephone interview. Over time, however, "people would come to him with weird ideas, expecting him to do for them what he had done for himself. And a lot of times they were really, really stupid ideas."

By 1988, Dahl told The Associated Press he had avoided interviews for years because of what he called "a bunch of wackos" appearing out of nowhere with threats and lawsuits.

Of the little rock that be-

came a household word, he said, "Sometimes I look back and wonder if my life wouldn't have been simpler if I hadn't done it."

Dahl designed and built the Carry Nations Saloon in Los Gatos, his wife said.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by a sister, Candace Dahl of Spokane; daughters Chris Nunez and Samantha Leighton; son Eric Dahl; stepdaughter Vicki Pershing and grandchildren.

Dahl and his wife were avid sailors on San Francisco Bay, where she plans to sprinkle his ashes in May.

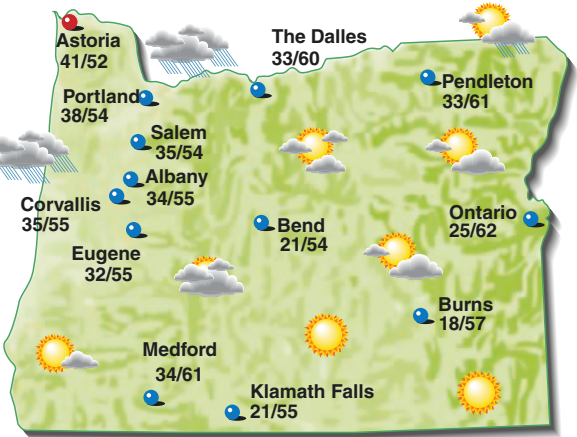

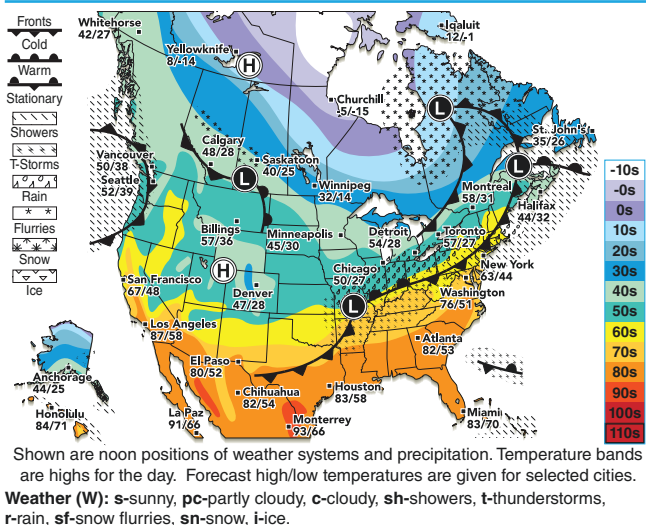
