Coast Guard helps rescue hiker

WARRENTON — The U.S. Coast Guard helped find a lost hiker and his dog Sunday night near Ocean City, Wash.

The 60-year-old man and his dog were lost for several hours before an MH-60 Jayhawk aircrew from Air Station Astoria

located them at about 11:15 p.m. with the help of Grays Harbor County search and rescue, according to a statement from the Coast Guard.

The man, who was reported in good condition, and his dog were taken to Ocean Shores Municipal

Airport after the rescue.

“The hiker was using an old lighter that would not light but would spark,” Lt. Cmdr. Daniel Leary, the rescue pilot aboard the Jayhawk, said in a statement. “Through night vision goggles it looked like a flashlight.”

Speaker talks about salmon forecasts and ocean conditions

MANZANITA — The Lower Nehalem Watershed Council, as part of its 2015 Speaker Series, presents “Using Ocean Conditions to Forecast Salmon Returns to the Columbia River,” by National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration senior scientist Bill Peterson, Thursday at the Pine Grove Community House, 225 Laneda Ave. in Manzanita. There is no cost for this event.

The doors open at 6:30 p.m. for refreshments and snacks. The presentation begins at 7 p.m., and the LNWC regular business

meeting follows.

Peterson will discuss his research on the correlation between physical and chemical ocean conditions, plankton biomass and species composition, and adult chinook and coho counts at Bonneville Dam. He will also cover how recent ocean temperatures in the North Pacific have been anomalously warm, with extreme salinity and zooplankton characteristics, and what this means for salmon runs in 2015.

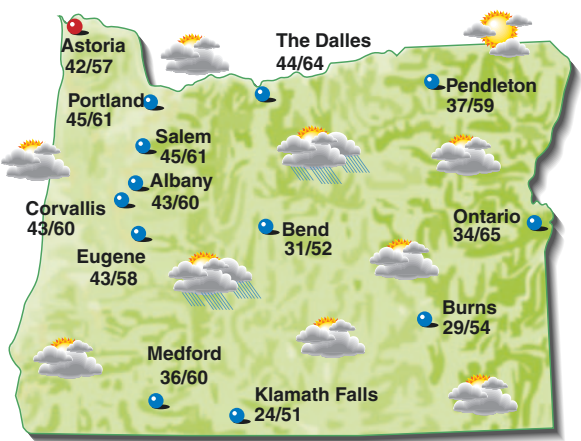

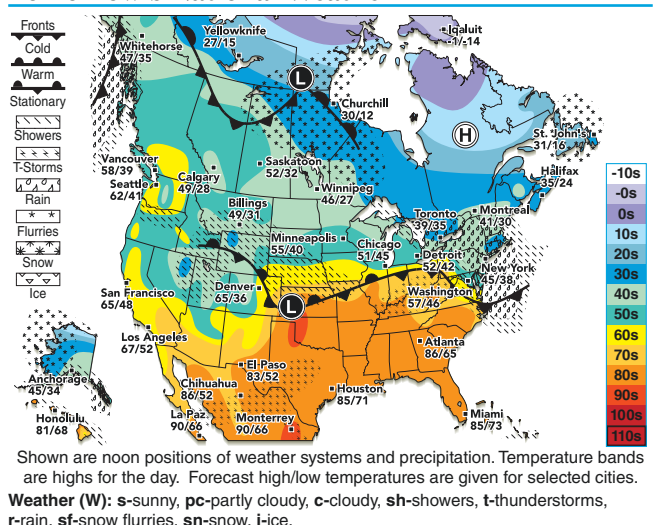

College offers work-related classes

Clatsop Community College offers several occupational certificate classes starting this month, including:

- **Flagger Training:** This class prepares flaggers to train or retrain for certification in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana. Students must register and pay at least two days before class, which runs from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. April 11 at CCC's main campus, 1651 Lexington Ave. in Astoria. Cost is \$80.
- **CPR for Health Professionals:** The American Heart Association Basic Life Support for Health Care Providers is designed to provide health professionals training to recognize several life-threatening emergencies, provide

CPR, use an automated external defibrillator and relieve choking in a safe, timely and effective manner. Students must register and pay at least two days before class, which runs from 8 a.m. to noon April 14 at CCC's main campus. Cost is \$40 for registration and \$20 to the instructor at class for the book.

- **CPR/First Aid:** Participants will develop the skills to provide care in life-threatening emergencies such as respiratory or cardiac problems, sudden illness or injury. Instruction on using an AED is included. Students will receive the American Heart Association First Aid/CPR/AED two-year card. Students must register and pay at least two days before class, which starts at

1 p.m. April 14 at CCC's main campus. Cost is \$40 for registration and \$20 to the instructor at class for the book.

- **Alcohol Server Training:** This is a required training to obtain an alcohol service permit for anyone in Oregon mixing, selling or serving alcohol and anyone who manages employees with these responsibilities. Register at least two days before class, taught by Action Server Education from 1 to 4 p.m. April 17 at CCC's South County Campus, 1455 N. Roosevelt Drive in Seaside. Cost is \$35 to the instructor and \$23 for the permit application, payable at class.
