

Port of Longview works on crude oil refinery proposal

PORTLAND (AP) — The Port of Longview, Wash., says it's working with an energy company on a proposal for a new crude oil refinery, the first such facility on the Columbia River.

Port documents released Wednesday show Riverside Energy, LLC last summer sought to build the refinery

and a unit train rail loop to receive oil-by-rail shipments from the Bakken region.

The documents were obtained in a records request by the group Columbia Riverkeeper.

Port of Longview spokeswoman Ashley Helenberg said that proposal is now "dormant," but port officials

are still working with the company.

Riverside Energy officials did not immediately return calls for comment.

According to the previous proposal, the refinery could process up to 30,000 barrels per day into diesel, gasoline, and jet fuel and would ship those fuels down the Columbia

Central Puget Sound closed for chinook

BREMERTON, Wash. (AP) — For the first time in years, state fishing regulators say there will be no recreational fishing season for chinook salmon in central Puget Sound this year.

The Kitsap Sun reports that officials hope putting the fish off-limits for at least a year will help rebuild their dwindling stocks in the Lake Washington basin. The decision, announced Wednesday, covers what is known as Marine Area 10, from

Dyes and Sinclair inlets to Seattle.

The state says their numbers have declined about 25 percent since they were listed under the Endangered Species Act in 1999.

Sport fishing groups aren't happy about the total closure. But tribal fisheries managers said that with ongoing habitat loss and this year's weather pattern, including warmer water temperatures, this could be a bad year for the fish.
