Burnard throws no-hitter No. 5 for Knappa

No-hitters are no big deal for the Knappa Loggers. Not when you play in the Northwest League, and you throw one every week.

The Loggers had thrown four no-hitters coming into Friday's 11-0, 10-0 doubleheader baseball sweep over Nestucca; they tossed another in Game 2, and they'll likely throw several more before the season's over.

It was Tyson Burnard's turn Friday. After Chase Rusinovich tossed a one-hitter in Game 1, Burnard struck out 10 and walked one in the second game, for Knappa's fifth no-hitter of the season.

The games were played at Astoria's CMH Field.

"We're thankful to Astoria and to Howard (Rub) for opening up that facility for us," said Knappa coach Jeff Miller, whose team has yet to be challenged in league play. "We probably could have made it through two games on our own field, but this is real nice to have."

The Loggers are 12-0 in league, with all 12 games lasting just five innings because of the 10-run mercy rule. Knappa (averaging 17 runs per game, to less than one for their opponent) has outscored the rest of the NWL 204-9. Friday's 11-0 and 10-0 wins were by far Knappa's closest league games of the season.

Both pitchers threw just 64

"We've just had very efficient pitching," Miller said. "We've had very low pitch counts in most of our games. We have one of the deepest defensive teams we've ever had, but they're just not getting a lot of chances when the pitching has been so efficient.'

With Rusinovich, Burnard and Dale Takalo (and Andy Miller working his way back into the rotation), the Loggers will have Class 2A's deepest pitching staff entering the state playoffs, less than a month away.

In Friday's first game, Rusinovich struck out 11 batters, while Knappa built a 9-0 lead after two innings.

Justin Dragoo was 2-for-2 with a double and drove in two runs, as did Andy Miller.

Nate Truax belted a home run with three RBIs in Game while Burnard, Jason Miller and Noah Kinney both had two hits. Kinney had a double and scored three runs, while Dragoo had a triple.

Burnard walked a batter in the fourth inning, for Nestucca's only baserunner.

Knappa's no-hitters and blowout wins should continue this week against Vernonia, a team that lost two games Friday to Faith Bible — the same Faith Bible team that Knappa outscored 64-5 two weeks earlier.

After their three-game series with Vernonia, Knappa plays three with Gaston and finishes with Portland Lutheran.

'We finish with the three strongest teams in the league," coach Miller said. "All three are capable of beating us."

The Gulls showed that they are still the state favorites at the 4A level, as they fired a 320 team score to take third overall in the 11-team Crook County Invitational, held at Meadow Lakes Golf Course.

Bend — the defending 5A state champion — won the team championship with a 306 team score, followed by Pendleton (313) and Seaside. The rest of the competitive field included Mountain View (329), Hermiston (333), Ridgeview (352), Crook County (356), Molalla (428), Redmond (435) and incomplete teams from La Pine and Sis-

Seaside had four players in the top 17, joining Bend as the only teams to accomplish that feat. Sam Hinton finished third overall with a 74. Teammate Aaron Richardson was 14th (81), followed by Shane Fritter (16th, 82), Trenten Meyer (17th, 83) and Kevin LaCoste (26th, 88).

"This was a great tournament for us to see where we stack up against some of the better teams in the state," said Seaside coach Jim Poetsch. "Bend won the 5A title last year and will be in the thick of things again this year. Pendleton and Hermiston finished sixth and seventh last year and returned all of their players. Ridgeview finished third in 4A last year before moving up to 5A this year. To compete in a field of this caliber and finish third should give us a boost as we head into the
