Columbia River Symphony to present two concerts

Music celebrates space exploration

ASTORIA — The Columbia River Symphony presents two family-friendly concerts May 8 and 9 featuring music celebrating humanity's exploration of space.

"We choose to go to the moon in this decade and to do other things, not because they are easy, but because they are hard, because that goal will serve to organize and measure the best of our energies and skills, because that challenge is one that we are willing to accept, one we are unwilling to postpone, and one which we intend to win." This quote from President John F. Kennedy, made in 1962, seven years prior to the landing on the moon, was the inspiration for the Columbia River Symphony's upcoming concert series.

Each piece has been carefully selected to reflect specific events in mankind's quest for the moon and beyond. Many adults will identify with the timeline, while the youth will enjoy the differing sounds and harmonies in each piece.

On display at the concert will be a number of space memorabilia, which recount the moment when Apollo 11 landed on the moon July 20, 1969. During the intermission, children will have an opportunity to draw scenes of

space exploration and hand in their drawings after the concert. The drawings will then be placed on the symphony website.

The concerts are scheduled for 7 p.m. Friday, May 8 and at 3 p.m. Saturday, May 9 at the Astoria Masonic Lodge, located at 1572 Franklin Ave. Both concerts are free, but donations are welcome.

Musical selections will include Brian Drake's "One Giant Leap," a tribute to NASA's Apollo moon landing; Nolan E. Schmit's "Encomium for the Courageous," a memorial piece for the astronauts aboard the space shuttle Columbia; music by James Horner from the film "Apollo 13"; and other selections honoring achievements in space.

Led by conductor Cory Pederson, Columbia River Symphony is an all-volunteer, nonprofit performing arts group. The mission of the Columbia River Symphony is to provide quality musical entertainment, to increase visibility of its performers' talents, and to serve a leadership role in the community while promoting cultural enrichment.
