
Binoculars are recommended, and there are a few binoculars that first-timers may borrow.

A Spring Warbler Walk will take place from 8 to 10 a.m. Monday, May 18. Meet at the Sunset Beach Trailhead. This hike will be approximately 2 miles along the Fort to Sea Trail to look for springtime migrants traveling up through the Neakoxie wetlands.

The Fort Stevens Monthly Bird Survey will take place from 9 to 11:30 a.m. Monday, May 25. Meet at Battery Russell in Fort Stevens State Park. Help out with this citizen science project to monitor six distinct habitats in the park for bird life. The sites will be accessed by walking and driving.
