Project helps decrease erosion and enhance fish habitat and water quality

KNAPPA — Local companies quickly responded in April when the North Coast Watershed Association needed help with a project to improve a public access site along Big Creek.

The site off Old Highway 30 was worn out from heavy use and off-road driving and had a large mud puddle.

The Nicolai-Wickiup Watershed Council, a subcouncil of the North Coast Watershed Association, received a \$1,960 grant from the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife to overhaul the parking lot with new gravel and boulders.

Vinson Brothers Construction was hired for the project, but Teevin Bros. donated the boulders and Hampton Affili-

ates donated the gravel.
"The local companies were really helpful," said Brooke Duling, the new watershed coordinator for the North Coast Watershed Association. "I was impressed with how generous they were for this project."

Filling the mud puddle and using boulders to protect vegetation from vehicles is expected to help decrease erosion and improve fish habitat and water quality along Big Creek.
