Greg Newenhof agrees to pay \$221,901 for historic property

Senate gives fish commish go-ahead to Buckmaster by 18-12 vote

SALEM — The Oregon Senate voted Thursday morning to confirm two

controversial appointees to the Oregon Fish and Wildlife Com-

mission. The sportfishing industry and some recreational anglers lobbied hard to stop Gov. Kate Brown's appointment of

Astoria resident Bruce Buckmaster to the commission because of his work on behalf of the commercial fishing industry, but the Senate voted 18-12 to confirm Buckmaster. The Senate also voted 27-3 to confirm Jason Atkinson of Jacksonville to the commission. Senators voted unanimously to confirm 92 other appointments by the governor to various boards and commissions.

During a committee hearing earlier this week, sportfishers said they want the governor to appoint a commissioner who works in their industry. It is unclear how Brown might respond to that request, but the Senate Committee on Rules held back the governor's two reappointments to the commission - Holly Akenson of Enterprise, and Michael Finley of Medford — because senators said they were concerned commissioners did not do enough to prevent budget problems at the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife.

The seven fish and wildlife commissioners serve four-year terms and are appointed to represent the state's Congressional districts. Brown appointed Buckmaster to fill the position representing Oregon's 1st Congressional District, after former Gov. John Kitzhaber left that position vacant for more than two years.

Sen. Arnie Roblan, D-Coos Bay, carried the Buckmaster nomination. Buckmaster previously owned a salmon feed company and served on the board of Salmon for All, a group that represents commercial fishermen, processors and other businesses on the



Developers pitch potential fallback for Heritage Square

As Astoria looks to Heritage Square for a new library and mixed-use housing project, some have not given up on renovating the existing public library and, if possible, the old Waldorf Hotel.

The City Council this week adopted goals for the next fiscal year that include looking into a new library with housing at Heritage Square, a definitive course after

months of uncertainty about a location. Behind the scenes, though, some remain interested in working with the city to expand the aging Astoria Public Library at 10th and Exchange streets into

the vacant Waldorf Hotel next door and using the top floors of the hotel for hous-

Ted Osborn, the president of the Lower Columbia Preservation Society and a retired architect, has shared drawings for a renovated library and hotel with housing. He has said he would consider developing the housing portion of

Others, including developers working with Suenn Ho, the Portland urban designer behind the Garden of Surging Waves at Heritage Square, have also shown interest.

City Councilor Cindy Price was unable to convince the council to add the option of renovating the existing library to the goals for next fiscal year, but she does want an alternative to Heritage Square.
