National park pavement project to start this week

The Daily Astorian

Fort Clatsop Road, within the Lewis and Clark National Historical Park, will be undergoing a pavement preservation project Tuesday through Thursday.

Drivers should anticipate 15-minute delays between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Traffic in the area will be restricted to one lane during the project as a contractor applies a flexible pavement full depth patch to some areas. An asphalt overlay will be placed on one mile of the Park Entrance Road.

Work will begin 0.3 miles south of the intersection of Fort Clatsop Road and U.S. Highway 101 Business. All areas of the park, including the Fort Clatsop Visitor Center, Fort Clatsop replica, Fort to Sea Trail Head and Netul Landing canoe and kayak launch, will remain open during this project.

Additional pavement work will occur within the Fort Clatsop Visitor Center parking lots, the Fort to Sea Trail Head and Netul Landing parking areas June 29 to July 2.

"We greatly appreciate your understanding and apologize for any inconvenience this preservation project may cause," Lewis and Clark National Historical Park Superintendent Scott Tucker said. "This project will take a large bite out of the deferred maintenance backlog for the park."

Construction to begin on 16th Street sewer project

Construction of Astoria's 16th Street Combined Sewer Overflow Separation Project is scheduled to begin today. This project is part of the overall CSO control plan that is designed to significantly reduce discharges of combined storm and sanitary sewage to the Columbia River and Youngs Bay.

The scope of the project includes construction in the following locations: 14th Street from Duane Street to Lexington Avenue; 15th Street from Commercial Street to Irving

Avenue; 15th from Jerome Avenue to Madison Avenue; Grand Avenue from 15th to 16th Street; 16th from Marine Drive to Lexington; 17th Street from Duane to Jerome; 18th Street from Exchange Street to Grand; and Jerome from 14th to 15th.

Construction begins on 14th between Duane and Franklin Avenue. According to the longterm project schedule, the crew will be working east street by street to 18th. Work on each numbered street begins at the bottom of the hill and progresses south up the hill. It is very likely

that the project will require multiple crews working simultaneously to complete the project on schedule by November.

This project is funded in part with a financial award from the Water Fund, funded by the Oregon State Lottery and administered by the Oregon Business Development Department.




