Old-fashioned drip coffee will be on sale for half price — 75 cents.

The Hanthorn Cannery Museum invites the public to see the new lighting inside the museum, paid for by grants from the Clatsop County Cultural Coalition and proceeds from the Bumble Bee Shop. There is also a new exhibit, including items donated after Carruthers Equipment Company's recent closure.

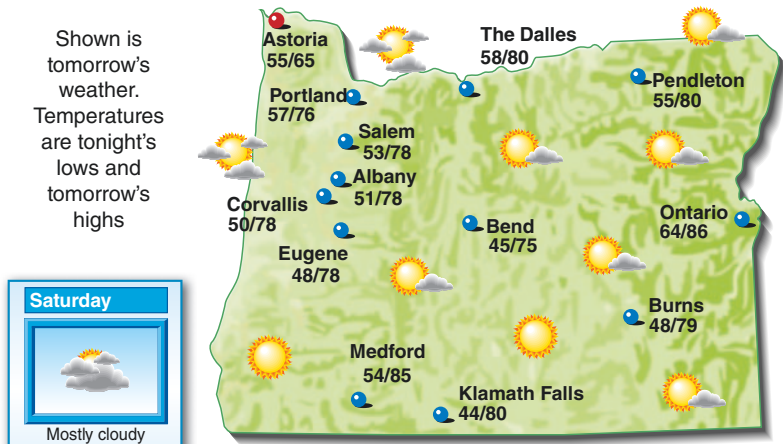

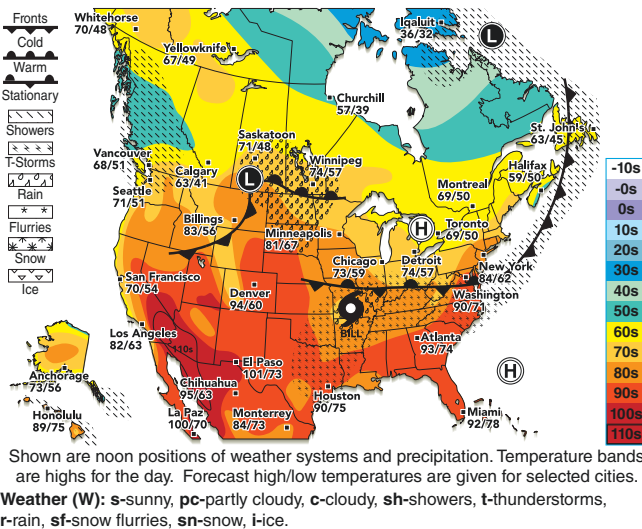

The goal of the free, daylong event is to educate horse owners and potential horse owners on all facets of equine stewardship and

opportunities in the region. The focus is on horse ownership, nutrition, training and recreation opportunities.

The event includes seminars for first-time horse owners, places to ride around the Oregon Coast and Clatsop County, horse care and using horses for therapy.

It will have demonstrations of cowboy dressage,

mountain trail obstacle courses and the Oregon Teens & Mustangs program that has teenagers tame wild mustangs. There will also be vendor booths and other displays.
