## Food carts, marketplace to make debut this weekend

Riverwalk FoodCarts and Marketplace, an effort six months in the making, will start in earnest this weekend at the corner of Sixth Street and Marine Drive.

Warren Bechtolt, whose family owns the property, said there will be a soft opening of the new community gathering spot about 10 a.m. Saturday, with a grand opening July 4.

It's a soft opening, he said, be-

cause he's not sure who will show up. "It's difficult to tie these folks down," he said, adding two food vendors have confirmed so far, along with six craftspeople and two produce dealers. Most vendors, he added, will stay until 3 or 4 p.m. Saturday, while

some might stay through Sunday. "We're not trying to compete

with Sunday Market," Bechtolt said. "We're trying to supplement them."

Bechtolt said organizers, realizing there isn't the population to have just a food cart pod, expanded the concept to a bazaar, craftspeople, produce and a swap meet, taking in vendors with antiques or other items to deal.

Bechtolt said his family looked at food cart pods in Bend and Portland, and hope to incorporate some of their elements into the RiverWalk Marketplace, such as a fire pit and a performance area. For now, he said, the plan is to continue through Christmas and sell trees at the marketplace for the holidays.

"If the local community supports it, and we can figure out how to weatherize it, we might do longer," Bechtolt said, adding the marketplace needs a daily presence of food vendors to be successful.
