Moody, mysterious settings showcase her figurative images, as well as her landscapes, still life and portraiture included in juried and private collections throughout the United States and Europe. She has exhibited in world-class galleries and continues to teach and lecture on art.

Her signature artwork employs the dramatic chiaroscuro lighting and luminous glazing that the timeless influences of the Old Masters have

What began as a classical Flemish art training early in her career eventually led to her experimentation with the methods of Baroque Realism, Classical Naturalism, and Russian Impressionism. Her inexhaustible desire to excel in oils has taken her into the studios of contemporary masters such as Zhang Wen Xin, Richard McKinley, Sherrie McGraw, Kim English, Cheri Christensen and Craig Srebnik, among others. The result of this rigorous fine art background is a body of work representing technical virtuosity while maintaining the original passion and singularity of her world view.

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# CCC to offer photography workshops

ASTORIA — Clatsop Community College will offer two photography workshops in August taught by local photographer and teacher David Lee Myers.

The cost of each workshop is \$285.

The first class, Outdoor Camerawork, will be offered from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Aug. 3 to 7. Participants will go out

and photograph in a variety of locations. The workshop focus is finding worthwhile scenes, composition and framing, and working with light. Most of the class will be spent out in the field with cameras. Participants will also learn to use the camera controls, starting with the basics and progressing to advanced techniques. Digital cameras will be most convenient for the

class, but film cameras may be used; the college does not have developing facilities.

Digital Processing and Printing will be held 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Aug. 10 to 14. Participants will learn computer editing, basic adjustments and how to prepare different file formats for different purposes such as the web and printing. Advanced techniques will in-

clude adding text for posters or storytelling, high dynamic range, and panorama stitching. The course is taught in the college's graphics lab, equipped with modern iMac computers and Photoshop, and a professional Epson photographic printer.
