Two peninsula cities ban personal fireworks because of fire danger

PACIFIC COUNTY, Wash. — Two cities in Pacific County have banned citizen use of projectile and aerial fireworks for the Fourth of July holiday, citing an unusually dry June and high fire danger.

At a special meetingFriday, the city of Ilwaco voted to pass an ordinance allowing Ilwaco Fire Chief Tom Williams to declare a fireworks ban in the city limits, but had to schedule another special meeting Monday to actually approve the ordinance.

Under the original wording, the ordinance (and thus the ban) couldn't go into effect until five days after it

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The last straw: City, property owner clash over bales

Fire chief saw a fire hazard in 'mountain' of gardening straw

No, the rodeo was not in town. That mountain of straw stacked off Niagara Avenue was Jean Reitman's innocent plan to improve a slope near her home she had stripped of pesky Himalayan blackberry.

Astoria Fire Chief Ted Ames saw the 9 tons of straw bales as a fire hazard on a weekend when the National

Weather Service ultimately issued a red flag warning for lightning.

The standoff between the private property owner and the city boiled over Friday when crews spent hours removing the straw bales to a city yard near the Astoria Sports Complex.

Reitman, 61, a retired physician who moved to Astoria from Southern California earlier this year for health reasons, thought she was out about \$5,000 worth of straw and substantial delivery costs. She was also informed by the city she would get an invoice for the removal.

By Monday afternoon, though, tensions were dif-

City Manager Brett Estes said the city had agreed to bring the straw back to Reitman's property in smaller batches so she can complete the land-scaping project. She will not be billed for the removal.

Reitman, who had been exploring legal action against the city, was relieved.

"So it's just a matter of whether it's a verbal Band-Aid or whether they are really going to follow through with what they promised," she said. "And that remains to be seen."

For Reitman, the experience was an unsettling example of often blurry property lines near public right-of-ways.
