The crowd cheered as the floats went by, but the three children were silent as the Fort Stevens State Park float, which carried a taxidermy elk surrounded by vegetation, went by.

Local groups, businesses,

radio stations, public departments and more took part in the parade. The Astoria Regatta Court waved from their float, followed shortly by Pack 509 and the Nordic Viking Dancers, who danced rather than walked down the street.

Farther down the road from the Wilkinsons, Astoria resident Katherine Mather watched the parade from outside the Maddox Dance Studio, wearing one of the red, white and blue leis handed out around that block. She's sat in the same place during the parade for at least 15 years and appreciates getting to come to a smaller parade.

"I come and try to stake out my place early," she said.

Mather and her four children set up well before the parade began, joining countless others setting up their chairs that lined the road up and down the parade route, which ran from the post office on Main Avenue to the Grade School.

"I'm really blessed that I have the children," she said. Mather said she wanted her children to learn about the country and why they're celebrating the Fourth with a parade.
