SALEM — The director of Business Oregon, the state agency that promotes new and expanded business in the state, is leaving after slightly more than a year in office.

Gov. Kate Brown announced Sean Robbins' resignation Wednesday. It will take ef-

fect in the fall.

Her announcement said that Robbins, his wife and two young sons will return to Wisconsin, where Robbins worked for nearly a decade before he became chief executive of Greater Portland Inc., a public-private partnership, in 2011.

He was named by then-Gov. John Kitzhaber to lead the Business Development Department, also known as Business Oregon, in June 2014.

"I'm grateful to Sean for his leadership and contribution to Business Oregon over the last year," Brown said in her statement. "He crafted a thoughtful vision into an effective strategic action plan for the agency, laying a solid foundation for the next director."

His is the second resignation of an agency director within the past week. Erinn Kelley-Siel is leaving as director of the Department of Human Services, which has the largest workforce in state government, upon Brown's appointment of a suc-

Both mentioned family reasons as paramount in their resignations.

State Sen. Betsy Johnson, whose budget subcommittee handled the Business Development Department spending plan, said she accepts Robbins' explanation that his resignation was prompted by family reasons.

> in the Portland Tribune, Robbins said Oregon cannot compete with other states that offer cheap land and public subsidies to new businesses.

"If it's most important for your business to be in the cheapest state you shouldn't be in Oregon," he said. "But if you're looking for talent, innovation, a place that

talent wants to be, this is a place to invest.' Yet Robbins said Oregon is very competitive

on the West Coast. 'We have some value to add to people in California and Washington who simply can't afford to

live there any more," he said. Robbins succeeded Tim McCabe, who retired after six years of leading the business agency.

Before Robbins came to Oregon in 2011, he was executive vice president of the Madison Regional Economic Partnership in Wisconsin for two years, and senior vice president of Vanta Commercial Properties for two years before then. He was a commercial real estate analyst in the Milwaukee area from 2003 to 2007.

PORTLAND — A Shell Oil icebreaker retreated today after a showdown with environmental activists dangling from Portland's tallest bridge.

Protesters on St. Johns Bridge and kayakers on the Willamette River below have been blocking the icebreaker from heading to the Arctic for a drill operation.

The icebreaker Fennica arrived in Portland for repairs last week. The vessel was damaged earlier this month in the Aleutian Islands when it struck an underwater obstruction, tearing a gash in its hull.

It started its journey ω the Arctic early Thursday before stalling in the face of 13 dangling activists linked by ropes. It then turned around and inched its way back to Vigor Industrial's dry dock, delighting those gathered on

shore in the city known for environmentalism.

Shell icebreaker retreats after showdown

"I think it's inspirational," Portland resident Lisa Szot told The Oregonian. "It's a really beautiful protest."

The U.S. Coast Guard warned the danglers they were breaking the law, but took no action. Petty Officer 1st Class George Degener said the agency did not tell those aboard the icebreaker to turn around

"I don't know what led the master and the pilot on board to come to that decision," he

The icebreaker is a key part of Shell's exploration and spill-response plan off Alaska's northwest coast. It protects Shell's fleet from ice and carries equipment that can stop gushing oil.

Environmentalists hope to delay the ship long enough for winter weather to prevent Shell from drilling until 2016.

By that time, they hope the Obama administration has a change-of-heart on the issue.

"There is no Plan B, just as there is no Planet B; we have no intention of moving until President Obama rescinds the permit for Shell to drill in the Arctic," said Daphne Wysham of the Center for Sustainable Economy.

Shell did not immediately comment Thursday.

Portland police closed the bridge to traffic during the standoff. It was reopened shortly after the icebreaker reversed course.

The activists say they have water and food for the long haul. They also have their phones to stay in the so cial-media loop.

"The fennica is headed back to its dock where it belongs — not the arctic! (hash) ShellNo," tweeted Dan Cannon, a Greenpeace activist dangling from the bridge.
