Training to help monitor dead marine birds

The Coastal Observation and Seabird Survey Team will hold a free training session on data collection of dead marine birds, according to a news release from the group.

The session is scheduled from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Aug. 29 at the Ilwaco, Wash., Timberland Library meeting room. Those interested can

reserve a training spot by calling 206-221-6893 or by emailing coasst@uw.edu.

The training will provide potential volunteers with introductory information followed by hands-on work identifying marine birds using a field guide, "Beached Birds," and specimen examples, such as bird feet, provided by the group.

Collecting data on the dead birds provides a baseline of

beached bird deaths on north Pacific beaches, so volunteers are needed to collect that regular information.

The Coastal Observation and Seabird Survey Team is a monitoring program through the University of Washington that relies on citizen participation and partnership with several groups to track ecosystem health. The organization has more than 800 volunteers in four states.

Oil-by-rail terminal poses environmental risks

VANCOUVER, Wash. — The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency says a plan to build the nation's largest oil-by-rail terminal does not comply with the federal Clean Water Act, and that a key permit for the project should be withheld

until its risks are addressed.

The Columbian newspaper reported that the EPA expressed its concerns in a letter last week to the Army Corps of Engineers, which is considering whether to grant the permit. Tesoro Corp. and Savage Cos. hope to build a terminal that would handle an average of 360,000 barrels of

crude oil per day. The oil would arrive by rail and leave by ship.

The EPA's letter raised numerous concerns, including the risk of oil spills.

The National Park Service has also expressed worries. Environmentalists opposed to the project say the letters could be "a game-changer."

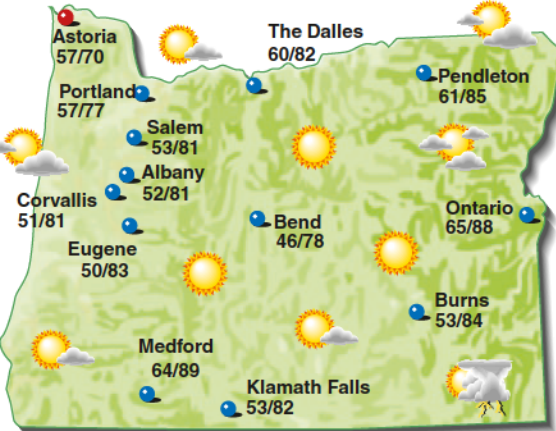

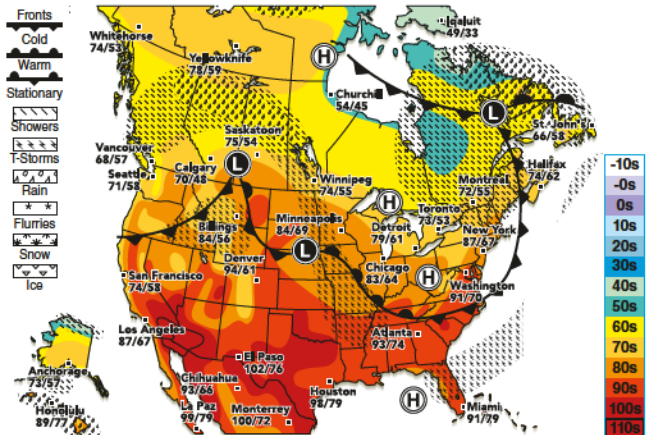
