In observance of Labor Day on Monday, all federal, state, county and city offices and services, including Astoria, Warrenton, Gearhart, Seaside and Cannon Beach city halls, are closed.

All U.S. post offices are closed and there is no mail delivery.

Astoria, Knappa, Warrenton/Hammond, Seaside (including Cannon Beach and Gearhart schools) and Ocean Beach School District schools are closed. Clatsop Community College is closed Thursday, Friday and Monday. Jewell School District schools are closed Friday and Monday.

The Astoria Library, Sea-

side Library, Warrenton Library and all Timberland libraries in Washington state, including Ilwaco, Ocean Park and Naselle, are closed. The Port of Astoria offices

and services are closed. Garbage collection through Recology Western Oregon (covering Astoria, Seaside, Gearhart and Cannon Beach), city of Warrenton garbage collection, and Peninsula Sanitation (covering the Long Beach, Wash., Peninsula) are not affected by the holiday. Recology Western Oregon and Peninsula Sanitation's transfer

stations are open. The Sunset Pool in Seaside is open from noon to 5 p.m.. The Astoria Aquatic Center is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The Clatsop County Heritage Museum, the Oregon Film Museum and Flavel House are open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., and the Carriage House is open from 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The Uppertown Firefighters' Museum is closed. Capt. Gray's Port of Play and Lil' Sprouts are closed. Fort Clatsop is open from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. The Columbia River Maritime Museum is open from 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. The Seaside Museum is closed.

Sunset Empire Transportation ("The Bus") is not running

buted in May, but an August event was canceled.


The event at McClure Park on Saturday starts at 8 p.m. The cost is \$5. The movie goes off at 9 p.m

Five Oregon confined animal feeding operations under fire

SALEM — Expansion plans at several Oregon dairies have caused a backlash among vegans and animal rights activists, but farm regulators lack the authority to consider many of their objections.

Likewise, the Oregon Department of Agriculture can't do much about dairy industry concerns that publicly disclosed regulatory filings will expose farms to trespassing and vandalism.

As mandated by the federal Clean Water Act, the agency issued a public notice in June that five dairies are seeking to change their animal waste management plans.

Wym Matthews, manager of the Department of Agriculture's Confined Animal Feeding Operation program, said such notices are fairly routine, but this one was somewhat unusual because four of the five dairies want to expand their herds.

After an article in Salem's Statesman Journal described these plans, the agency received enough requests for a public hearing that one was scheduled Wednesday.

Previously, such hearing requests were rare, Matthews said. "I think the interest is new.'

Several of the people requesting a hearing identified themselves as vegan, he said.

"These two- to three-dayold babies are torn from their mothers and then slaughtered," he said.

Worries about exposure

During a July meeting of an advisory group for the feeding program, some livestock industry representatives expressed worries that information contained in the waste management plans, such as the farm's location and layout, will expose dairies to retaliation from activists

Dairy and agriculture representatives later said a Statesman Journal article mischaracterized their comments as trying to hide information from the public.

Tami Kerr, executive director of the Oregon Dairy Farmers Association, said they were simply worried about private information being misused and not about the contents of the waste management plans becoming public.

"We were asking questions and expressing concern for our producers," Kerr said. "We're not trying to hide anything. I'm a big fan of transparency."

While the Department of Agriculture can redact confidential business information — such as financial data or experimental water treatment systems with patents pending — the bulk of these plans must be publicly disclosed under the Clean Water Act, Matthews said.

"We're required to by law," he said.




