Later in his endeavors to connect to his passion, Howard enjoyed meeting with members of the Northwest Steelheaders Association, Sandy River Chapter, and volunteering with them. He especially loved helping children learn about the joy of fishing, including young cancer patients. He caught his last fish at age 91 while fishing for sturgeon in the Lower Columbia River, guided by his nephew, Russ Hickman, and assisted by his fishing partner, his son.
