Small Business Management Program, Inc., has taken its classes online.

The nonprofit, which split from the college's small business program in 2012, offers one evening class a month from October through May, an on-site visit each month to discuss issues with a business, and online access.

The program is directed

by Jim Entler, the former instructor for Clatsop Community College's Small Business Management program for about 20 years before he retired in December 2011.

When a \$1 million budget shortfall forced the college to make a number of cuts, including laying off 40 percent of its faculty and restructuring the business department, Entler said he did what he could to preserve the program. The

college still operates its own small business management program as well.

The curriculum for Entler's program utilizes the University of Minnesota's successful Farm Business Management program, which provides education for farm families and started in 1952.

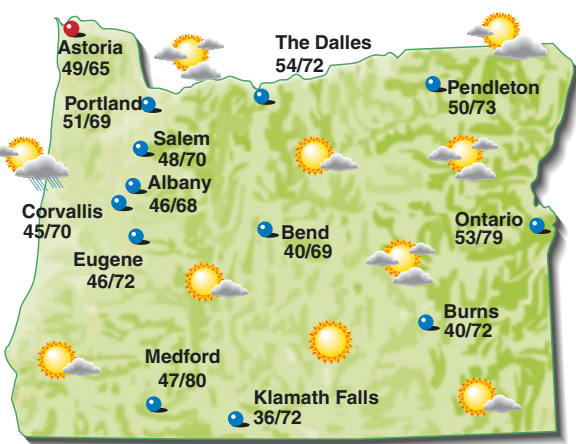

Tonight's Sky: Cassiopeia, the queen, is in the NE this evening. The constellation looks the letter M or W.

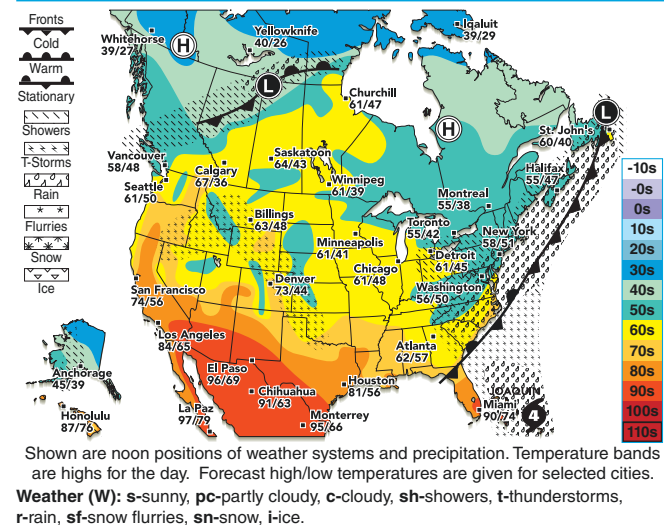

Gertrude (McKay) Sharp

Seaside

Sept. 20, 1920 — Sept. 24, 2015

Gertrude (McKay) Sharp, 95, of Seaside, passed away in her sleep on Sept. 24. Born Sept. 20, 1920, the fifth of eight children of Will and Nina McKay of Duluth, Minnesota, Gertrude grew up on the family estate along the shore of Lake Superior.

In 1942, Gertrude earned her nursing degree at St. Luke's, and was commissioned in the U.S. Army. She served during World War II in London, England, where she married Dr. Edward Sharp in 1945. After the war, the couple settled in his home town, Philadelphia, to establish their medical practice, and raised a family of three sons. As the boys grew up, Gertrude also

worked as a registered nurse in the Philadelphia school system, and volunteered in local scouting activities. A sketch artist from youth, she contributed to publications and displays by regional and national medical associations.

Following the death of her husband, Gertrude moved first to the Seattle area, to assist her

own long-lived mother. In 1977 Gertrude chose Seaside as her permanent home, with its rocky beaches and limitless horizon of water, reminiscent of her original Great Lakes environment. She enjoyed beachcombing and gardening, as well as biking on the Prom or around town. Cards and letters to friends and family would continue

to include pen and ink sketches, well into her 90s. But in a generational leapfrog, she also embraced computers and email, and enjoyed reading classical literature on her Kindle.

Gertrude is survived by her three sons, Robert, Donald, and Edward; her grandchildren, Nathaniel and Benjamin; great-grandchildren, Christian and Andrea, niece, Dr. Deborah McKay; and extended family. A private family service was held, with interment at Willamette National Cemetery.

Remembrances in Gertrude's honor may be made by any good deed or caring act, in the spirit she lived her life, and of her favorite verse, Romans 8:28.
