

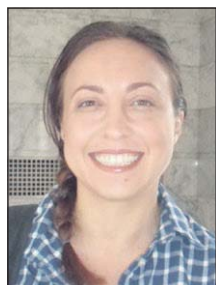

OBITUARY

Curtis Alexander Seymour

Redmond
Dec. 15, 1941 — Oct. 6, 2015

It's with deepest regret that the family of Curtis Alexander Seymour announces his peaceful passing on Oct. 6, 2015, in Redmond, Oregon. Curtis is survived by his wife Ginny Seymour; sons Samuel Seymour and Erick Knight; daughter Shelby Zadow; grandkids Madelyn Knight, Leo Knight, Shelby Seymour and Bennett Zadow; brother Bob Seymour; cousins Madeline Miller, Linda Kruss, Marvin Methven and Bill Seymour; and many nieces and nephews.

Curtis was a larger-than-life person with a huge heart, and his absence will be greatly felt by all those who knew him. Those who loved him know he liked to tell a good story, wear colorful socks, walk his dogs, drive his big yellow truck and hunt. But most of all, he loved his family and his wife deeply. He was a faithful person whose handshake was his word, and whose friendships spanned the decades.

Born in San Francisco, California, on Dec. 16, 1941, he grew up in a family-owned apartment complex in Hollywood, California, amongst his grandparents, aunts, uncles and cousins, whom he considered as close as siblings. Curtis loved to regale people with stories of his youth, including climbing trees to listen to concerts at the Hollywood Bowl, washing the car for the actor who played "The Fugitive," and cruising the boulevards.

He was always a hard worker and his first job was at age 9 as a paperboy. In Hollywood, Curtis attended Blessed Sacrament School and St. John Vianney, where he created many friendships that endure to this day, and was a main organizer of yearly "good ol' boy" reunions of friends from that era.

At the urging of a friend he moved to Idaho in 1962 to attend the University of Idaho. There he met his lifelong love and spouse, Ginny Wood Seymour. Then, two months before he received his degree, he was drafted. He joined the Navy, married, and was deployed to the Vietnam War in 1967. He was stationed in Guam, served in the Tet offensive and spent time at Da Nang Air Force Base. He returned home in 1969, and served for 30 years in the reserves until retiring with honors as a chief warrant officer.

Returning home from the war he had a choice to move back to California, or take a job as a bank manager in Idaho. He chose Idaho as the place to raise his small family, and spent the majority of time in Orofino. It's in Orofino that he became an avid hunter and fisherman, and his favorite place to go was Joseph Plains. He was manager of the First Security Bank there for over a decade.

Shortly after his youngest child's graduation from Orofino High School he and his wife moved to Astoria, Oregon, where he was the manager at Western Bank of Astoria. There he enjoyed whale watching and spending time at the beach, and also took up buffalo hunting in Montana and Eastern Oregon, and fishing in Alaska.

It was late in life that Curtis decided to go back to college. He got his accounting degree, became a certified public accountant, retired from the bank and started his own home ac-

counting and tax service business. This allowed him to do one of the things he loved most — travel. In later life he moved to Clarkston, Washington, and most recently Redmond, Oregon, where he could be closer to his brother.

Curtis was always an active community member, and was a member of Knights of Columbus, OCI, Kiwanis, the Astoria Clown Society, the first Astoria Trolley volunteer driver, and most recently the Band

of Brothers in Redmond, Oregon. He dutifully donated to many charities, but his favorites were always the wildlife charities, Helping Hands, the local shelters and ASPCA. If you would like to do something in his honor, the family would ask you to consider one of these charities.

Curtis lived life with a positive spirit. He loved to meet new people and go to new places. There is a big shadow where a rainbow once stood, and he will be dearly missed.

Curtis's funeral service will be held at St. Matthews Episcopal Church in Portland, Oregon, at 12:30 p.m. on Monday Oct. 19. There will be an opportunity during the service for anyone who would like to share a memory to speak.

A full military graveside service and burial will be held at Willamette National Cemetery at 2:30 p.m. that day, including Bannermen and the presenting of the flag. The burial will be followed by dinner and a celebration of life.

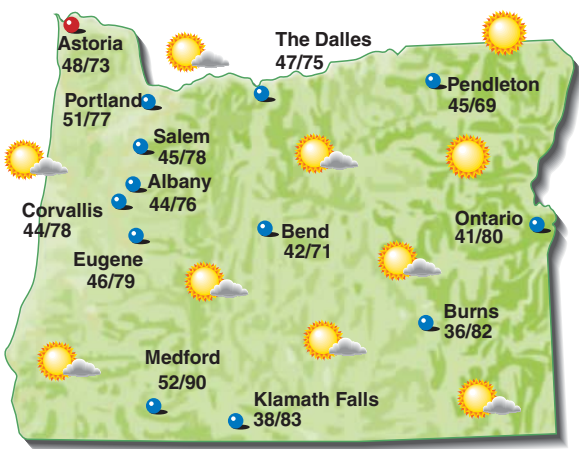

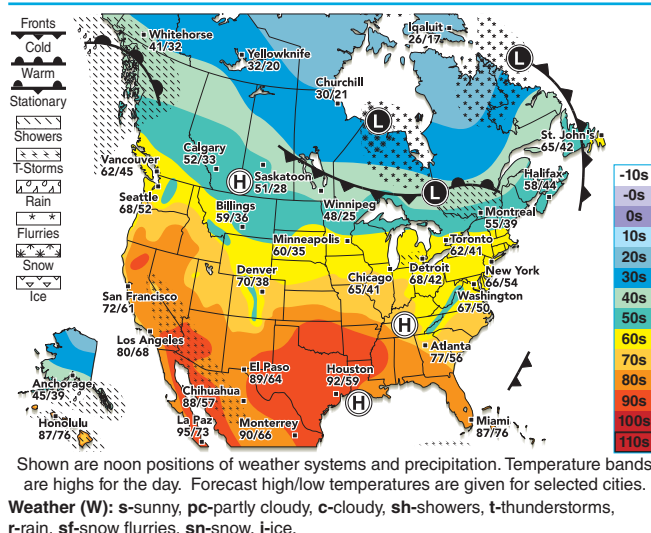

PORTLAND — Columbia Riverkeeper is holding its 15th Anniversary Celebration and Clean Water Champion Awards from 6 to 9 p.m. Saturday at Axiom Custom Products, 2424 N.E. Riverside Way.

The Astoria group, Columbia Pacific Common Sense, is receiving the Partnership Award at the event for its efforts during

the last 10 years to help Riverkeeper protect the Columbia River from liquefied natural gas import and export terminals.

Other recipients include: former U.S. Rep. Elizabeth Furse, the Riverkeeper Lifetime Achievement Award; Bob Sallinger of the Audubon Society of Portland, the River Hero Award; Hoesly Eco Automotive, the River Protector Business Award; and the students at Sun-
